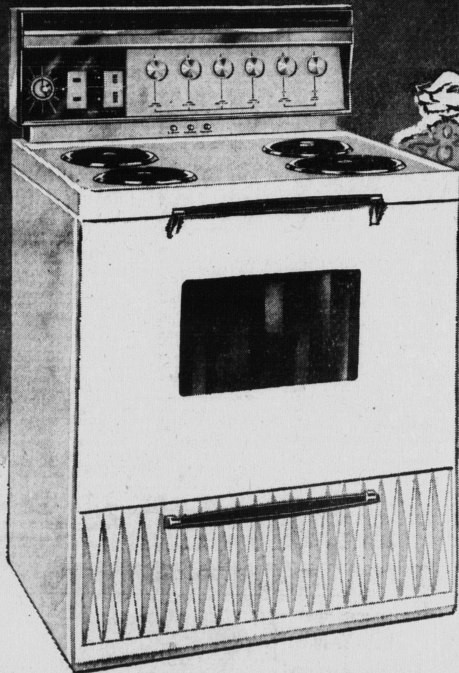


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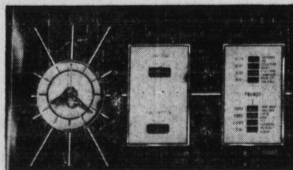
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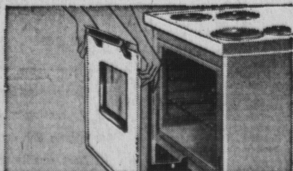

Autopsy On Paret Shows No Evidence Of Old Injury

NEW YORK (AP) — Benny (Kid) Paret, who was proud of his ability to take a punch and fire back, died Tuesday, 10 days after he was battered senseless in losing the world welterweight boxing crown to Emile Griffith. The stocky, 25-year-old Cuban, star of one bruising battle after another since he started his U.S. campaign four years ago, never regained consciousness after being pounded against the ropes in the 15th round at Madison Square Garden March 24.
A two-time welterweight champion, he became the first defender of a title ever to suffer fatal injuries in the ring. He was the third fighter to die of boxing injuries this year and about the 45th since 1900, according to ring historian Nat Fleisher.
There was criticism that he had fought too soon after taking a severe beating in a 10-round knockout loss to NBA middleweight champion Gene Fuller at Las Vegas last Dec. 9. There was worldwide criticism, too, of the Paret-Griffith fight and cries for the abolishment of the sport.
The autopsy Tuesday, however, showed no evidence of an old brain injury.
HAD SLIM CHANCE
Doctors had given Paret only the slimmest chance of ever recovering from the injuries. After he had collapsed in the ring, he was taken to his dressing room and then to the hospital. Only a few hours after the Saturday night fight, he underwent a delicate three-hour brain operation to relieve the pressure of two blood clots. Doctors said

that "all that can be done has been done."
His brother Antonio, 26, and his manager, Manuel Alfaro, were with him when he died.
The 21-year-old widow, mother of Benny, Jr., 2, and expecting a second child — was called to the hospital when the fighter died.
"I've lost my man," she sobbed. "I want to go with him. Take me along..."
Clutching a gold cross hung on a chain around her neck, she cried hysterically. Then she fainted. She was given sedatives.
The body will be sent to Miami on Thursday for burial.

JFK To Toss First Ball

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House made it official Tuesday. President Kennedy will throw out the first ball of the 1962 baseball season here next Monday.
Kennedy will perform just before Washington Senators play Detroit Tigers. The game not only opens the baseball season but is the first major league game to be played in the big new District of Columbia Stadium.
Kennedy, a right-hander, made his debut as an opening day pitcher last season in old Griffith Stadium and demonstrated more pitching power than previous presidents had shown. His toss sailed over the heads of most of the players clustered in front of his box.

Barbara Wagner To Marry In June

TORONTO (CP) — Barbara Wagner of Toronto, a four-time world champion figure skater, will marry James David Grogan of Tacoma, Wash., in June, her mother, Mrs. James Joseph Wagner, announced Tuesday. Both are professional skaters.
Miss Wagner, 23, paired with Bob Paul to win the world pairs championship four times between 1957 and 1960 as well as a gold medal at the 1960 Olympics. Mr. Grogan competed in the men's singles in the 1948 Olympics and returned in 1952 to win a silver medal.
ENTRY PROHIBITED
OTTAWA (CP) — The post office department says it will refuse to accept Russian-bound parcels containing used linen, clothing and footwear. The Soviet Union has prohibited the entry of such parcels after May 15.

Eddie Arcaro Retires After Brilliant Career

NEW YORK (AP) — Jockey Eddie Arcaro retired Tuesday after a brilliant racing career of 30 years during which he became the greatest money rider of all time.
Arcaro, 46, bowed out at an informal dinner party in a midtown eatery where he has mingled with stars of baseball, football, golf and other sports for many years.
The King of Jockeys, he was called, and he rode many of the great horses of the last quarter century. He won a record 549 stakes on tracks in every part of the land. He has ridden 4,779 winners with total purses of \$30,039,543, another record. His total victory list is exceeded only by Johnny Longden, who won more than 5,500.
The dapper little Italian-American from Cincinnati hasn't ridden in his country since last Nov. 12 at Aqueduct. The day after Thanksgiving he and his wife, Ruth, left on a 3-month vacation to the Orient and South Pacific. He rode in an exhibition in Tokyo, and made several appearances in international races in Sydney, Melbourne and other Australian cities.
It was his longest absence from racing, excepting for a couple of long suspensions for rough riding. He was barred a year from Sept. 28, 1942 to Sept. 19, 1943 after he admitted trying to pitch jockey Vincent Nodars into the Aqueduct infield during the Cowdin Stakes.
He has had several bad spills. He went down with Gun Fire at Chicago in 1933, and was out four months with a skull fracture and punctured lung. He had another close call June 18, 1959 at Belmont Park when Black Hills broke a leg during Eddie. He was out for a month with a concussion and bruise.

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
