Bob Shaw Lifts Mets

It is said that Rome was not built in a day or even in years but Bob Shaw has come close to building New York in two weeks. Or rather building the image of the New York Mets.

For in that time Shaw has managed to win four consecutive ball games and that is a mark which no Met pitcher has been able to accomplish in the five year history of the league. The news that Shaw was to go to the Mets from the league leading San Francisco Giants broke on June tenth catching the baseball world unawares. Obviously his new teammates took the news with glee too for they have given him adequate support, both on the field and at the plate, in his four starts.

The Mets were only half a game out of eight places on Saturday and this would be a dizzy height for them at this time in the season. As it is they have played seven less games than the Braves, who occupy seventh place, and that is a lot better position than any observer would have them at the start of the year. As it is they have to play about 500 ball in these seven games to move into eight and they could do that.

It is interesting to note the effect that a know winner can have on a club. Shaw comes from a winning club and one can safely say that he is making himself heard on the Met roster. Drysdale has been pitching well but just has not been able to buy a win in the past few games. When interviewed before the game that was televised on Saturday he expressed confidence that he would soon break the slump. "A slow start and a fast finish is often the case" he pointed out and once he starts to win watch out. The Dodgers have been close to the top all year what with Asteen and Sutton pitching so well and Drysdale has actually been more of a hindrance than a help for he has needed so much help he has hurt the bullpen.

However the wins in September are what count and when it comes down to the wire you can bet that Drysdale and Koufax will be winning those crucial double headers. It could be that the Dodgers will be the first repeat winner in the loop for many many seasons.

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Buckpasser Breaks World Mile Mark

CHICAGO (AP) — Buckpasser, resurgens brilliantly after missing all of the triple crown activity because of injury, has unseated Kentucky Derby winner Kaul King as top candidate for the three-year-old racing crown this year.

Buckpasser set a world record for the mile Saturday, winning the \$106,000 Arlington Classic in a heralded showdown with Kaul King and Creme Dela Creme.

Ogden Phipps' colt, cleverly ridden by Braulio Baeza, was clocked in 1:32.35 while beating Creme Dela Creme by 1 1/4 lengths for the \$63,000 top swap.

Mike Ford's Kaul King, winner of the Preakness and the Kentucky Derby, finished a struggling fifth, and his owner said the son of Native Dancer had trouble with his left front ankle.

The former world mark for one mile was 1:30.5, first set by Swaps in 1932 and since equaled by Intentionally, Pia Star and Hodayze.

IMPRESSED BY SPEED

Both Baeza and trainer Eddie Popp were especially impressed by Buckpasser's great speed. "I was only considering him for the June 4 that the colt first tested a hoof that sustained a quarter crack in March.

Koufax scattered seven hits and struck out 11 in pushing past San Francisco's Juan Marichal, who failed in a bid for his 14th victory Saturday night.

Koufax has lost twice.

The winning run was earned with one out. Maury Wills went all the way to second when shortstop Denis Menke let his grounder get away from him. Clay Carroll then relieved starter Denny Lemaster and hit Willie Davis with a pitch Davis followed with his double to left-center field.

Ralston washed out Richey's fourth round match against Tony Roche of Australia Saturday and left the Texas facing a weekend of suspense.

"I'm not going to let it upset me but I sure wish we could have played on schedule," Richey, 19, said.

Richey, the U.S. No. 3 player but unseeded at Wimbledon, was the underdog in today's match against Roche, the French and Italian championships this year.

Ralston already is in the quarter-final bracket. He and Richey are the only survivors of the 16 U.S. men who set out on the long Wimbledon road Monday.
