Rocket Launching Base Is Far Away For Canada

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker indicated this week it will be a long time—if ever—before Canada has its own satellite launching base.

However, he said in the Commons, the government believes that Canadian scientists are fully qualified to participate in the satellite program and should not be held back because this country has no launching base.

Therefore, the U.S. had been approached by the Defence Research Board and the Defence Research Telecommunications Establishment with proposals for a co-operative program of development in the satellite field. As a result, Canadian scientists would provide the instruments for a satellite that would be launched in the U.S., possibly in 1961.

"Insofar as a satellite is concerned," Mr. Diefenbaker said, "the United States already has expensive and complex bases for

launching earth satellites, and it will be a considerable time—if ever—before it will be economic for Canada to establish her own satellite launching base.

EVERY ENCOURAGEMENT

"We do not believe that Canadian scientists should be held back on that account and intend to give every possible encouragement to them to pursue this program and to add to the collective pool of knowledge which can be turned to peaceful pursuits."

Mr. Diefenbaker was explaining to the Commons that he was referring to previously-announced plans to send aloft a Canadian-instrumented U.S. satellite when he said Saturday in Prince Albert, Sask., that "a Canadian satellite is to be launched in 1961."

Under questioning by Hazen Argue, CCF House leader, and Opposition Leader Pearson he

said these plans were announced in April.

They call for a satellite, in which the instruments will be provided by Canadian scientists to be launched at the U.S. Vandenberg Air Base in California aboard an American missile.

Mr. Diefenbaker said it is to be put in a north-south orbit to travel around both poles. He said it would be launched in 1961 but information he now had was that it would not be launched before 1961.

Exactly what had the prime minister meant then, asked Mr. Pearson, when he said "a Canadian satellite is to be launched in 1961?"

A Canadian satellite would be one instrumented by Canadian scientists, Mr. Diefenbaker replied.

Outside the Commons, a spokesman for the Defence Re-

search Board said no consideration has been given by the board to establishment of a rocket range at Moosonee, Ont., as reported last week by The Financial Post.

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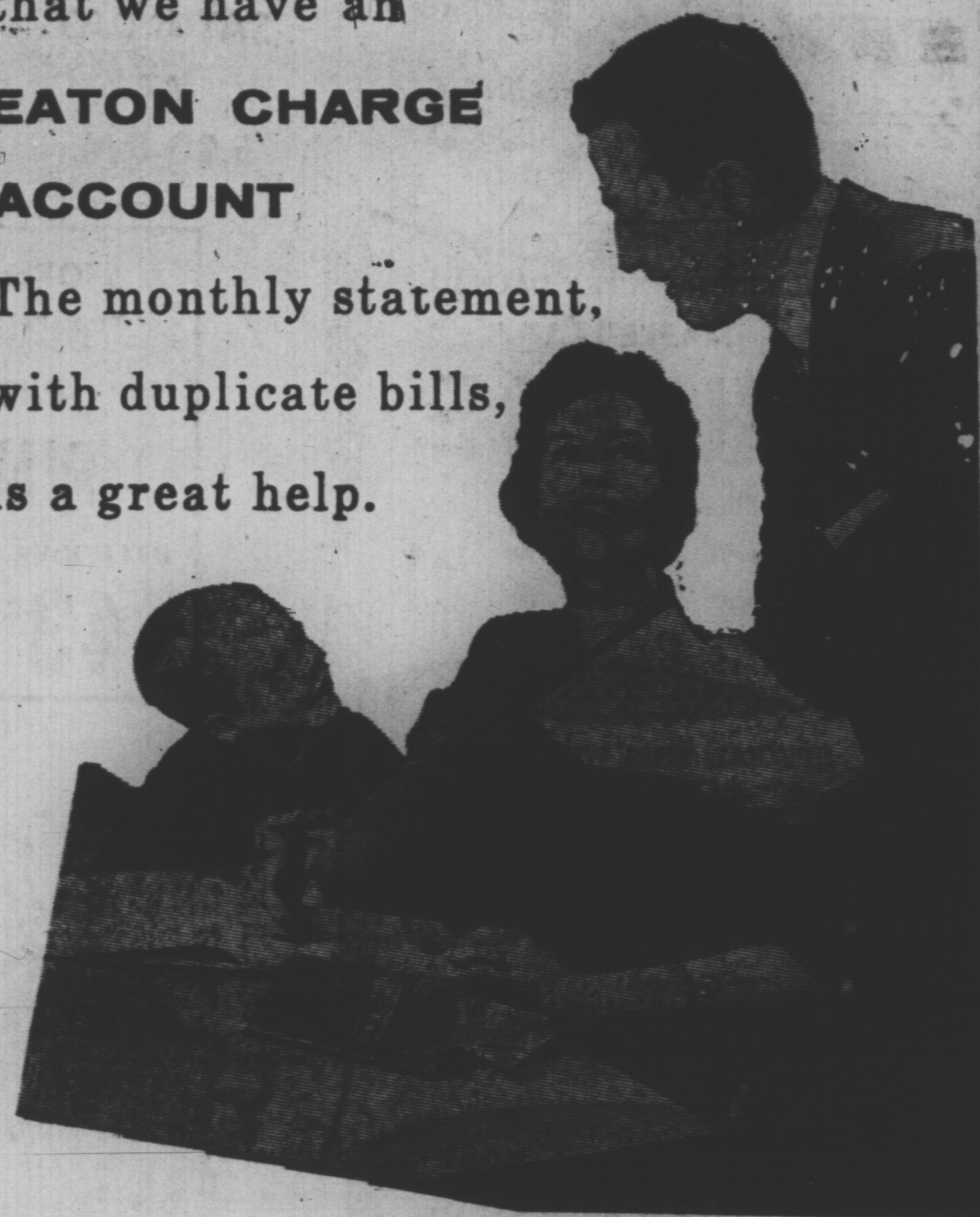
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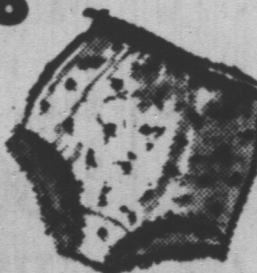
