SCHOOL UNIT NO. 1

To All Persons Qualified To Vote At School Meetings:

Take notice that for the purpose of electing TWO TRUSTEES for School Unit No. 1—One Trustee to each Polling Division—a poll will be held on Wednesday, the tenth day of June, 1953 from 12 o'clock noon to 9 P.M.

**POLLING DIVISION NO. 1**—Is defined as that portion of School Unit No. 1 formerly known as the school districts of Spring Park and Parkdale.

**POLLING DIVISION NO. 2**—Is defined as that portion of School Unit No. 1 outside the former school districts of Spring Park and Parkdale.

Nominations of candidates for election to the Board of Trustees shall be filed with the Secretary at any time up until 4 o'clock in the afternoon of May 30, 1953. Each nomination shall be signed by at least two sponsors who are ratepayers in the Unit. The candidate must be a ratepayer resident in the Division and, unless such candidate is a parent ratepayer his or her nomination paper must be signed by at least one parent ratepayer.
