Unemployment Figures For Kings, Queens Drop

The unemployment figures for Kings and Queen Counties decreased by 200 during the first two weeks of March, it was learned yesterday from George Cheverie, manager of the Charlottetown branch of the National Employment Service. This figure includes all those persons having obtained employment during the period, and those whose eligibility to draw unemployment has expired. The large drop in such a short time leads to increased optimism for the spring and summer months. While the employment office has a number of qualified applicants in all skills, the recent construction boom in Prince Edward Island is making it increasingly difficult to obtain these skilled workers after the end of March, Mr. Cheverie said.

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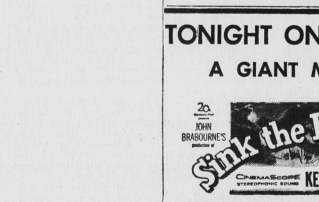
