A Problem Solved.

WASHINGTON, August 3.—A movement of considerable magnitude is now on foot to arrange for the deportation of the negroes of the southern states to Liberia. Captain John Murray and W. B. Lewis, representing Elder, Dempster & Co., of Liverpool, owners of an important line of steamships, have been at Chamberlain's for some days in consultation with Benjamin Gaston, the authorized agent of the Liberian emigration company. The negotiations between them have been carried to a successful point and an agreement has been reached whereby a fleet will be at the disposal of the colored people. Ships will sail at frequent intervals from southern ports direct to the African coast, and it is believed the first contingent will be ready to start inside of two months. One of the company's vessels is now at Baltimore. Captain Murray talks enthusiastically of the good to accrue to the negroes by emigration to Liberia.
