BLIND GUIDES GO CAMPING TOO

The Captain of the 3rd Brantford Girl Guide Company at the Ontario School for the Blind tells the following story of a camping trip by blind guides. "Friday, May 31, 1946—and teeming rain! For three consecutive years, the same kind of weather had cancelled our big week-end camping trip. This year we were going camping regardless. By Saturday morning a bitter east wind was howling and the clouds were looking blacker and blacker but our hopes were still high! At least it wasn't raining by 10 a.m. so final preparations were soon in full swing. "Food and equipment were loaded on a truck hired for the occasion. Then away we hiked, twenty-one Guides and two Guides out along the Grand River, till we came to our long-dreamed-of camp site. The truck was there to greet us. "By the time we had pitched our tents and unpacked the bedding, we were nearly finished. It was much more important, however, to have a roof over our heads under those gloomy skies! the previous year. The value of production in British Columbia made up 56 per cent of the Canadian total for 1946, being estimated at \$28,732,000. For Ontario, the estimated value of production is \$14,843,000; Nova Scotia, \$5,211,000; Quebec, \$2,022,000; and New Brunswick, \$666,000. First in importance, the apple crop had an estimated value of \$27,381,000 compared with \$12,857,000 in 1945, production amounting to 17,665,000 as against 7,635,000 bushels. British Columbia accounted for \$17,741,000 of this total, Nova Scotia \$4,958,000, Ontario \$3,099,000, Quebec \$1,200,000, and New Brunswick \$412,000. All five provinces showed substantial gains over 1945 for this crop.

Russians Jolted, Not Frightened By Truman Speech

MOSCOW, March 17—(AP)—Many Russians jolted by the latest turn in American foreign policy, profess to believe that high military authorities in the United States inspired President Truman's plea to Congress for financial aid to Greece and Turkey. The Russians believe that the military is in the saddle in the United States and behind the plan for giving aid to Greece and Turkey. There is an inclination among some Americans here to feel that Truman's plan and the resolute American stands at the Council of Foreign Ministers have more

or less swept the Russians of their feet and rocked them back on their heels. In the opinion of this correspondent they could not be farther from the truth. In the first place the Russians do not frighten easily. Secondly, they generally have an active course and pursue it. They seldom go to conferences or participate in them with negative programs. Thirdly, they see real danger signs ahead. Unquestionably conferences are being held nightly in the circles of persons who lead the Soviet Union. Russia's next course is being decided. There is serious doubt if anyone in these conferences has been frightened by Truman's proposal.
