Analysis Of Popular Vote In Federal Contest

(By The Canadian Press) Liberal candidates had polled 48 per cent of the total, compared to 50 in 1949. They received 39 per cent of 5,246,130 votes cast in 1945.

The Progressive Conservatives polled 31 per cent of the vote compared with 30 in 1949 and 27 in 1945.

The CCF percentage was 11 compared to 13 in 1949 and 16 in 1945.

The Communist Labor-Progressive party, which put a record 100 candidates in the field without electing one, polled 61,703 votes. This was 1.1 per cent of the national total.

Social Credit, with a total vote of 309,957, got 5.7 per cent of the national total.

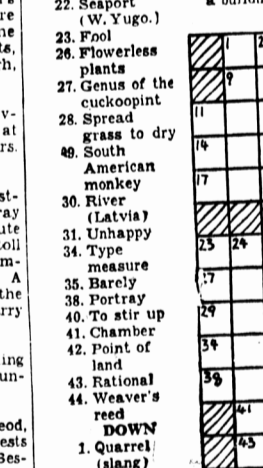

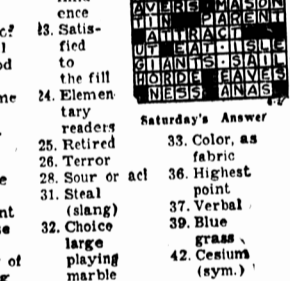

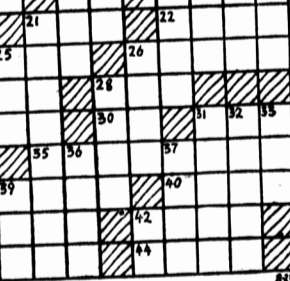
