### Oyster Club Sandwiches Lunch Or Supper Snack

We are half way through oyster-time. It's less than four months until May first, when the delectable oyster leaves the menu-spotlight. Then it is a long stretch until September first, when back comes the oyster in all its succulent glory.

### OYSTER CLUB SANDWICHES

(For Lunch or a Late Supper Snack) 12 slices deconstructed toasted white bread or cheese-bread (well-seasoned) 12 flattened lettuce leaves 36 small oysters or 24 large oysters sauteed in 1/4 c. butter. 12 slices crisp-fried bacon, halved 12 thin slices, firm fresh tomato seasoned with salt and pepper Side Garnish: 6 lettuce-leaf cups; 6 pimiento-stuffed olives. 6 ripe olives; cherry-pickles or small radish "flowers"

Spread hot toast lightly with mayonnaise piquante. Top 6 of them each with flattened lettuce leaf. Cover with 6 small butter-sauteed oysters or 4 large ones. Top, lay 2 halved slices bacon; 2 slices tomato, finish with remaining mayonnaise. Toast 1 slice. Press together. Place on medium-size plates. Cut sandwiches into diagonal quarters. To each serving, add a side-garnish of the lettuce-cups, filled with the ripe and stuffed olives and the cherry pickles or small radish flowers.

### VEAL "BIRDS" WITH OYSTER STUFFING

2 lb. veal steak or any tender cut veal sliced 1/2" thick 3 tbs. flour 1 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. pepper 1 recipe oyster crumb stuffing (see Chef?) 2 tbs. oil or bacon drippings 1/2 tsp. crushed grated lemon rind 1 1/2 c. boiling water

1 envelope beef broth powder 1/4 c. sour cream 12 half slices white bread toast. Cut veal in 12 (1 1/4) 6 squares. Pound with meat mallet or edge of saucer until they double in area. Mix together flour, salt and pepper; dust half of this all over veal. Center each piece of veal with heaping teaspoonful of stuffing; roll up. Fasten in shape with wooden pick; roll veal in remaining flour, salt and pepper mixture.

Brown all over in oil. Add 1/4 c. lemon rind, stir in water and 1/2 c. broth powder. Transfer to flame-resistant casserole. Bake 1 1/2 hr. in mod-oven, 325 degrees to 300 degrees F. or until veal is fork-tender. Remove picks; stir sour cream into gravy and bring to boiling point. Arrange veal on toast slices. Spoon over cream-gravy.

### THE CHEF'S OYSTER CRUMB STUFFING

Ingredients: 2 c. fine crumbs from deconstructed white bread, 3 tbs. melted butter or margarine, 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 1 tsp. poultry seasoning, 1 tbs. minced fresh or instant onion, 1 tbs. minced parsley, 1 egg, beaten, 1/2 c. shucked oysters, chopped coarse. To Do: Combine ingredients in order given except oysters. When mixed, mix in chopped oysters and any oyster liquid. The stuffing should be moist enough to hold together.
