\$60,000 Added To Student Fund

The original allotment of \$230,000 to students from P.E.I. under the Canada Student Loan program has been increased by \$60,000.

Premier Walter Shaw was informed of this yesterday by Finance Minister Walter Gordon. This province was originally allotted about \$230,000.

Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, found that an additional amount of about \$40,000 was needed to take care of outstanding loan applications. He made representation to the federal government for additional funds.

Premier Shaw said he "is pleased the additional money has come through. There was a strong demand for it and it will be of very substantial assistance in providing support to students who may be having financial difficulties in securing a college or university education."

The community of Hasanlu was destroyed by invading armies some 2,700 years ago and remained buried for centuries until the 1958 discovery. It has been described as a man-made Pompeii because extensive fire damage caused sudden and violent death to many of the city's inhabitants who were unable to escape the conflagration, and were "frozen" in attitudes of life.

The usually short-lived mud bricks with which much of the city was built were preserved when baked by the fire and show that Hasanlu had its origins at about the time when Persian-speaking peoples began to settle in that area of the country.

Royal Ontario Museum Seeks Archaeological Site In Iran

TORONTO (CP) — Dr. T. Cuyler Young Jr., a young archaeologist with the Royal Ontario Museum, returns to his native Iranian mountains soon to search for the past.

Dr. Young, born in Resht, Iran, is hoping to discover a site that can be worked by the museum for the next five years. East in an area of the Middle East where little archaeological work has been done, it will be a new phase of Near Eastern archaeology for the famed Toronto-based museum.

Now 30, Dr. Young is assistant curator of the museum's Near East department and is travelling with him on horseback and by jeep will be Dr. Philip Smith of the University of Toronto's anthropology department and Lewis Lawley, a graduate student from the University of Pennsylvania.

The trio will explore the 20,000-square-mile Kurdistan area during the 10 months they will be away.

Smear Tactics Are Denied By Publisher

TORONTO (CP) — John Dupuis, federal minister without portfolio, is wrong in saying English-language newspapers generally and The Telegram specifically are making a "concerted effort to smear French-Canadian members of Parliament and ministers."

Mr. Dupuis made the statement in an interview in Ottawa Wednesday, Dec. 9.

In a bylined reply in Friday's issue of The Telegram, Mr. Bassett said his paper "has not only never followed a policy of trying to 'smear' French-Canadian members of Parliament but has tried to bring about greater understanding between the citizens of Ontario and Quebec."

"Mr. Dupuis does nothing to help understanding by attacking English language newspapers which are doing their duty in bringing to public attention events, unhappy as they may be, which happen to involve French-Canadians," the article added.

Officials said no estimate of damage has been made. One building was owned by Adelaar Leiger and the others by Lounsbury Co. Ltd.

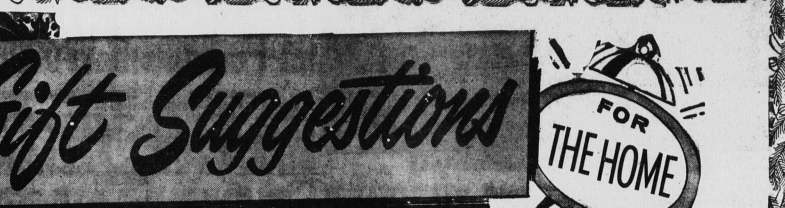
