

# Annual Parade Set For Friday

The result of weeks of work on behalf of organizers and planners of the Gold Cup and Sauer Parade will be visualized at 10 o'clock Friday morning as the parade shapes into one gigantic spectacle which has become an annual delight to all Islanders and visitors who are in Charlottetown on Gold Cup and Sauer Day.

The parade will form on North River Road between McGill Avenue and Belvedere Avenue. Inspector A. J. Dowling of the City Police, in releasing instructions to enable the parade to move smoothly and give spectators all possible chance to see the parade, has asked that all drivers avoid using this section of North River Road while the parade is forming.

Those living on the West Side of North River Road are asked to use Queen Elizabeth Drive.

Participants in the parade may park their cars in the large parking lot on the west side of the P.E.I. Hospital (entrance on Brighton Road).

From the formation point on North River Road, the parade will proceed east on McGill Avenue, south on Ambrose, west on Highland Avenue, south on North River Road, east on Brighton Road, to Euston Street, then south on Great George, east on Kent, south on Prince, west on Grafton, south on Queen, west on Water, north on Haviland, then along Rochford to Kent, then

# Penitentiary Term Is Given Accused

SUMMERSIDE — Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald sentenced James Emmett Labobe, Lennox Island, to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary when he appeared in Prince County Court yesterday morning on a charge of indecent assault on a minor. It was the opinion that the accused was in need of medical psychiatric treatment.

George Michael Kinch, Summerside, appeared on a charge of break entry and theft at Sharbell's store in Portage, to which he had previously pleaded not guilty, and the case was adjourned for a date to be set for trial.

James Joseph Veno, Toronto, was fined \$10 and costs for driving without a valid operator's license. Veno was involved in two weekend automobile accidents.

George Watson, Kensington, was fined \$25 and costs or 15 days for having care and control of a motor vehicle when his ability was impaired by alcohol.

Alfred (Junior) Arsenault, Kensington, was fined \$25 and costs for causing a disturbance in a public place.

Lloyd Gallant, Summerside, was fined \$25 and costs for causing a disturbance in the Kensington Legion. He pleaded not guilty to a separate charge of unlawful possession of liquor.

Wesley George Roblee, Tryon, pleaded not guilty to a charge of impaired driving. The case was adjourned to September 13 for trial.

Ivan Chester Adams, Montrose, was fined \$75 and costs for impaired driving.

George Curtis, Albany, was fined a total of \$49.50, including costs, on a charge of common assault.

Two persons appeared on drunk and incapable charges. One was given 20 days in the Queen's County Jail and the other fined \$10 and costs. Two persons also appeared on illegal possession of alcohol charges, under the Liquor Control Act and were fined.

# Pair Sought In London Cop Killing

LONDON (Reuters) — Police hunting the killers of three London policemen flashed across Britain Tuesday the names and descriptions of two men they want to question in the triple shooting.

They asked the public to inform police on Harry Maurice Roberts, 30, or John Duddy, 37. The men were described as armed and dangerous.

Earlier a third man, John Edward Witney, 36, was arraigned in court and ordered held in custody for a week for a further hearing on charges of murdering, with others, the three unarmed policemen in West London Friday. Witney was arrested Monday.

The three plainclothes policemen were gunned when they stopped a car containing three men for questioning near West London's Wormwood Scrubs prison.

Detectives—specially armed—launched Tuesday another round of high-speed raids on seedy restaurants and clubs in and around London, in a stepped-up hunt for the two men.

Port and airport officials were warned the two might try to leave the country.

## Minister Discusses Situation

The Hon. Daniel J. MacDonald, Minister of Agriculture, met recently with members of the Employment Offices in Summerside, and Charlottetown.

This meeting was arranged to discuss the Farm Labour situation in the Province with particular emphasis on the recruitment of potato pickers for the harvesting of this year's crop.

It was pointed out that with the number of people employed in the Atlantic region, that it will be extremely difficult to recruit workers this year especially in the areas where many of the potato pickers were available in other years.

There was a possibility that workers could be recruited in Newfoundland and if so it would be necessary to move these people into this Province by air transportation.

If charter flights could be arranged, the cost would probably be reduced under regular rates.

Mr. MacDonald was in agreement with the suggestions made and stated that with the increased acreage of potatoes in this Province this year, that all possibilities of securing competent labour for the saving of this crop must be investigated and

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
