A SPECIAL cable says there is a probability of Lord Lytton's recall to be succeeded by Lord Dufferin.

THE Small Debt Court opened this forenoon, when the judgments reserved from the last session were given.

MR. GUNN—Sir John McDonald's opponent in Kingston—has to go before the Court on a charge of corrupt practices.

HON. MACKENZIE BOWELL, Minister of Customs, and Hon. Mr. Masson, Minister of Militia, have been elected by acclamation.

THE storekeeper who left his cellar open with a light burning all last night offered special inducements to those who nightly make a business of foraging.

TRICKETT, the Australian sculler, challenges Hanlan or Courtney to a 4, 5 or 6 mile race for £2,000—give or take expenses, or he will go to neutral waters.

MR. JOHN AVARD, of Shemogue, took from Summerside, P. E. I., on the 26th ult., per steamer Princess of Wales 150 head selected stock which he intended to take to the State of Maine.

CHAS. DAVIES, son of George Davies, Esq., of this city, who has been pursuing his studies at the University at Edinburgh, has just passed a highly satisfactory examination, and has been admitted by the faculty as a medical student.

THE Quebec Chronicle states that the City Treasurer of Quebec, C. J. L. Lafrance, Esq., has received a cable from London, Eng., informing him that the new city loan of half a million dollars has been negotiated at 94, without any costs of commission or other disbursements.

THE Jacques Cartier election ballot box stuffing case has been concluded. Judge Ramsay's charge occupied two and a half hours. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty against Forget, Lamarche, Christian and Pilon, who all made default. Madore and Lemoy were acquitted.

THE special session of the Court of Chancery was adjourned yesterday, when the arguments on the injunction granted to Thomas Alley, Esq., to prevent Messrs. Duchemin Bros. from using a steam engine in their factory were completed. The Master of the Rolls has reserved his judgment in this matter.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon Charles Martin, found staggering about Queen street, was fined \$1 and costs for four days. Charles McCarthy, arrested for disturbing his son-in-law's household, was fined \$3 and costs or fourteen days. William Carroll was summoned by Dr. Beer for driving disorderly. The case was adjourned until to-morrow.

PRODUCE SHIPMENTS.—The following are the produce shipments from this port to-day:—Schooner E. Wise, Halifax, with 953 bushels potatoes, 827 do. oats, 44 do. turnips, 1,712 lbs. pork, 8 barrels oysters, by Clarke & Smith; schooner Mary Jane, Boston, with 4,041 bushels potatoes, valued at \$1,616, shipped by John Hughes; Annie May, Newfoundland, with 1,500 bushels potatoes, 300 do. turnips, by Capt. Gillan.

NOTWITHSTANDING the very disagreeable weather, the market to-day was well attended. Sales were lively at following prices: Beef, small, from 5 to 12 cts.; do quarter from 3 to 7 cts.; mutton, from 4 to 8 cts.; lamb, from 4 to 8 cts.; pork (carcasses), from 3½ to 4½ cents per lb.; geese, each, from 35 to 50 cts.; ducks, from 20 to 30 cts.; chickens, per pair, from 30 to 35 cts.; butter, fresh, from 20 to 24 cts.; do tub, from 16 to 18 cts.; potatoes, from 40 to 53 cts.; hay, from 40 to 50 cts.; oats, from 28 to 30 cents.

THE Danes continue to be attracted to their splendid settlement in New Denmark. Some come from the Western States; others cross the ocean. About a dozen persons, all told, came out by the Peruvian to Quebec, and from that point came on to St. John, whence they are being forwarded by Col. Shives. He has had some difficulty in understanding them, and if they continue to pour in, as we hope they will, it may be necessary for that officer to sit down and study the Scandinavian languages. Being a man of a cultivated mind he could not doubt soon do so. That Danish settlement is sure to be a great success.—St. John Tel.

WM CARROLL, a juvenile, was summoned to the Police Court this morning on complaint of Dr. Beer. On the night of the 28th ult. the Doctor was driving into the city by way of Haviland's Lane. When near the residence of Mr. Haviland he perceived two persons on horseback driving towards him at a furious rate. One of the horses, rode by a boy named Stanlake, passed closely; but a stirrup of the saddle on the horse which Carroll rode caught in the shaft of the Doctor's gig, knocked the Doctor out and tore the shaft from the gig. They then drove away, leaving the Doctor to himself. He afterwards discovered who they were, and is now about to prosecute them for disorderly driving. Dr. Beer's complaint was heard at the Court to-day, and the case adjourned until to-morrow.

Prince County Nominations.

SUMMERSIDE, Nov. 7.

Nomination passed off quietly. There was no excitement—no speeches.

For First District, Messrs. Ben. Rogers (Government), and James Barclay (Opposition) were nominated.

For the Second District, the Hon. Mr. Strong (Government), and Mr. Stuart Burris (Opposition), were nominated.

Messrs. Gavin and Perry were nominated for the First District in the House of Assembly.

A Russian Envoy to Afghanistan.

A Berlin dispatch of the 24th Oct. states that when General Stoietoff and his suite appeared on the northern banks of the Amu Darya asking for admission into Afghanistan, he was given to understand by the Afghan posts on the other side that the Beg sent for his reception having died suddenly, he must wait. And to wait he had, for a whole month, when admission was at last granted. Once on Afghan soil, he was treated with the greatest distinction. Shere Ali went out to receive him on the road, ordering a Royal salute of 115 rounds to be fired in his honor. The number of rounds accorded to the Viceroy of India by the Afghans is only 51. The Russian travellers found Afghanistan a poor, mountainous country, with bare hills and inundated valleys; the towns are dirty and the people seem destitute.

The Golos, commenting on the last negative answer of the Ameer, says that war between England and Afghanistan is unavoidable, and that as this will prevent England from continuing her energetic policy in the East, it cannot but be welcome news to all Russians. The Russian Government are constructing a telegraph from Samarcand to the Amu Darya. Shere Ali has offered to extend the wire to Cabul, a proposition which probably is already being carried out.
