Canadiens Take Big Lead With 3-1 Win Over Leafs

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens jumped to a commanding 2-0 lead in their Stanley Cup semi-final playoff Saturday night with a well-earned 3-1 victory over the puncheon Toronto Maple Leafs.

A forum crowd of 14,530 saw Canadiens score in each period, two of them on power plays, to thoroughly outplay the defending champions.

Coupled with Thursday night's 3-2 victory, the win sent the Habs to Toronto for games No. 3 and 4 Tuesday and Thursday with a solid two-game cushion.

Claude Provost, Jean Beliveau and Henri Richard were the Canadiens marksmen.

Rookie Ron Ellis counted the lone goal for the Leafs who failed for the second straight game to muster anything approaching a sustained offence.

MILD CONTEST

The contest was a mild affair in comparison with Thursday night's rowdy opener. Referee John Ashley called 19 penalties, including a misconduct to Montreal's Bobby Rousseau, but most of them were for chippy infractions rather than the vicious slugging which marred the first game.

Beliveau, the veteran Canadiens captain who has been a late-season standout, scored the winning goal in the final minute of the second period.

With Toronto's Bob Pulford in the penalty box, the big centre went out to slap a goal-mouth rebound over leaf nemesis Terry Sawchuk. Sawchuk had made a good save off Yvon Cournoyer, but was unable to corral the rebound fast enough to prevent Beliveau

Bisons Trip Hornets; Oscar Gaudet Tallies

Len Lunde and Oscar Gaudet scored Saturday night to give Buffalo Bisons a 2-0 victory over Pittsburgh Hornets in a rough, close-checking American Hockey League playoff game.

The victory gave the Bisons a 2-0 lead in their best-of-five opening series of the Calder Cup playoffs.

In the only other AHL game Saturday night, Hershey Bears got their first playoff victory by scoring twice in less than three minutes of the third period to defeat Baltimore Clippers 3-2 in the third game of their series.

Baltimore, with earlier wins of 2-1 and 1-0, held a 2-1 edge in games in the best-of-five series.

In Buffalo, goalie Ed Chadwick, who had five shutouts during the regular season, blanked the Hornets by making 17 saves. Pittsburgh's Hank Bassen had 34, some of them sensational.

Lunde, who led the league with 50 goals during the season, put the Bisons ahead in the sixth minute of play, scoring when the Hornets were short-handed on a pass from behind the goal by Art Stratton.

Charlottetown minor hockeyists added Provincial titles to their credit at the Forum on Saturday morning in the Paperweight and Pee Wee Divisions when they defeated representatives from the RCAF base at Slemon Park, in the second of two-game total goal series finals.

Red Wings Defeat Hawks; Howe, Hull Get 2 Apiece

DETROIT (CP)—Detroit Red Wings overpowered Chicago Black Hawks before a crowd of 15,002 Sunday night and dumped them 5-3 in the second game of the Stanley Cup semi-final series.

The win gave the National Hockey League champion Wings a 2-0 edge in the best-of-seven set and the series now switches to Chicago for third and fourth games Tuesday and Thursday.

Veteran right winger Gordie Howe led the impressive Detroit attack with a pair of goals, one while his club was short-handed. Defenceman Albert Langlois, Norm Ullman, Ed Joly and Parker MacDonald shared the others.

Detroit's victory offset another standout performance by Chicago left winger Bobby Hull, who counted two goals, giving him three for the series. Fred Stanfield counted the third Hawk goal.

The Wings were particularly impressive in the third period after Hawks had pulled to within one goal on Hull's two goals. They put the pressure on and scored two more to wrap up the win.

Four of Detroit's six goals came while the Hawks were short-handed.

The teams each counted a goal in the opening period, but the Wings came on strong in the second and counted two unanswered markers.

The game was roughly played and saw three Detroit players injured. Midway through the second period, Larry Jeffrey collided with Hull and hit the ice heavily. The Detroit left-winger had to be carried from the ice on a stretcher and taken to hospital. Preliminary reports indicated a back injury.

Shortly after Jeffrey's mishap, defenceman Gary Bergman was struck by an errant stick and had to have four stitches in his right cheek. In the third period, defenceman Doug Barkley also was clipped by a stick and received four stitches in his upper lip.

Referee Frank Udvari was kept busy throughout, assessing 13 minor penalties to Chicago and nine to Detroit. Hull received a five-minute major for highsticking when Barkley was cut and Detroit's Ted Lindsay sat out a 10-minute misconduct.

Stanfield opened scoring at 1:39 of the first period when he took a pass from Red Hay and broke in on the right side. He fired a knee-high shot into the right corner.

The Wings had a two-man advantage following Stanfield's goal when Hull went off for highsticking and Pilote was nabbed for tripping eight seconds later. However, the Chicago defence gave goalie Denis DeJordy superb coverage and he was able to keep the Wings from scoring.

EARNED COUNT

Langlois evened the count at 8:44, blasting a shot from the left point with DeJordy screened on the play.

In the second period, with three Chicago players and one

breakaway. The muscular Chicago winger went down at the point to stop a pass but it skittered by him and Howe picked it up. The 30-year-old veteran broke in on DeJordy, pulled him to one side and fired a short drive from about 10 feet out to give the Wings a 3-1 margin.

Detroit opened the third period on a power play and Howe turned and sent a backhander through a maze of players clustered in front of the Chicago net.

Great Players Taken From Northern Ont.

In the 1920s and '30s, Northern Ontario was a favorite hunting ground for National Hockey League scouts. And they plucked some good ones—Larry Aurie, Taffy Abel, Pep Kelly, Bob Gracie, Don Grosso and many others.

Around Sudbury and North Bay, old-timers still talk of Jim Dewey, the man they say was the greatest who never turned pro. Memories of Dewey were rekindled this week when he died in Toronto at the age of 52, a victim of leukemia.

Older sports fans remember him as the star of a Sudbury hockey team that won the Allan Cup in 1937, in the palmy days of Canadian senior hockey when the Allan Cup was a rival to the Stanley Cup. After Maxie Silverman's Wolves won the title that year just about every pro scout in the country went after Dewey.

But Jim simply laughed them away. He was busy learning the silver mining business.

Silverman had gathered together a powerhouse that year. Included on the Wolves roster were Red Hamill, Bingo Kampanin, Grosso and Murph Chamberlain, chaps who later went up to the NHL. But Dewey decided his future was in the north. He became an acknowledged expert in diamond drilling and gained rich fees as a consultant in a private capacity.

He later moved to Toronto and two years ago doctors gave him from one to three years to live.

Buffalo now leads the best of five series 2-1. The next game will be in Pittsburgh Wednesday.

Art Stratton put Buffalo ahead in the second period. The Hornets then came back with three goals in the same period by Lafarge, Warren Godfrey and Lafarge again.
