## WHO WILL WEAR THE RED HAT?

### Mgr. Duhamel and Archbishop O'Brien

MENTIONED IN CONNECTION WITH THE APPOINTMENT.

It is Believed That Archbishop O'Brien Will be the Favored One.

OTTAWA, April 14.—There is little possibility that Archbishop Duhamel will be the next Canadian Cardinal.

While for some time the rumor has been going the rounds that the Archbishop of Ottawa would soon be chosen to wear the red hat, the case is viewed differently by those who are in a position to know. The fact of the matter is that the Diocese of Ottawa is too poor to support properly the dignity of the Cardinalate.

Mgr. Duhamel, in conversation recently, admitted this to be the case. He pointed out that it takes about \$20,000 alone for a cardinal's equipment. He believed that since Ottawa is thus precluded from the possibility of having a cardinal, Halifax will be the favored city and that Archbishop O'Brien will be appointed to the Sacred College.

### The Quebec Whip.

QUEBEC, April 12.—Le Soleil, liberal organ, talks very discontentedly to the Minister of Railways about the vacancy of the district superintendent, on the division from Riviere De Loup to St. Rosalie, caused by the retirement of Mr. Oullette. It tells the minister that no stranger should be appointed, and reminds him that he has already made the mistake of naming several strangers to places on the line and has had to remove them afterwards. Why, it asks, repeat the error.

### Gaspesia Safe.

HALIFAX, April 12.—Manager Yates, of the Canadian S. S. Co., has received a cable from Channel, Nfld., stating that the sealing steamer Hope has passed there with 26,000 young harp seals, the best catch of the year. She signalled having spoken the disabled steamer Gaspesia, so long imprisoned in the ice, south of Bird Rocks, in tow of the steamer Kite, apparently heading for St. John's, Nfld.

### British Appointments.

LONDON, April 12.—The appointments have been officially announced of Sir Julian Pauncefote, British Ambassador to the United States, Mr. Henry Howard, British Minister to the Netherlands, Vice-Admiral Sir John Fisher, and Major-General Sir John Ardab as members of the Disarmament Congress to be held at the Hague; of Baron Russell of Killowen, Lord Chief Justice of England, as members of the Venezuelan Arbitration Commission, in room of the late Lord Herschell; and of Charles Norton Edgcombe Eliot, Second Secretary of the British Embassy at Washington, as Great Britain's representative on the Samoan Commission.

Interesting Rumor Regarding Sir Hibbert Tupper.

HALIFAX, April 14.—A despatch from Ottawa to the Chronicle says that if Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper's present arrangements are carried out he will resign his seat for Picton at once and go into provincial politics in British Columbia.

His object is to endeavour to get control of the Legislature there and in this way manage to swing the province around in favor of the conservative opposition at Ottawa at the next general election.

It is probable that ex-premier Turner who sits for one of Victoria's seats will resign, and that Sir Hibbert Tupper will run in his place.

### Suicides in Paris.

PARIS, April 12.—Seventeen suicides were reported at the Prefecture of Police on Sunday last, nearly all of which were due to poverty. Saturday being quarter day, many of the victims were unable to meet the demands of their landlords, and in desperation resorted to asphyxiation by charcoal fumes.

### Over One Hundred Years.

WATERVILLE, Me., April 12.—Mrs. Phebe G. Ellis of Sydney, died at her home Tuesday morning, at the age of 102 years 3 months and 8 days, being one of the oldest and most respected citizens of the state. Mrs. Ellis was the daughter of Heuben Sawtelle, a native of Groton, Mass.

### Diseased Meat.

MONTREAL, April 10.—Ald. Lareau, a member of the Montreal City Council, at a meeting of the Council complained that a large quantity of diseased meat was being sent from Toronto to this city, and he asked that steps be taken to stop it. The matter was referred to the Market Committee.

## BRITISH BUDGET BROUGHT DOWN

### Greater Expenditure for Next Year

A SMALL SURPLUS FOR THE PAST YEAR

But Increased Expenditure Will Require More Revenue.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, April 14.—The Chancellor of the exchequer has presented the budget.

He said that the trying periods of last year, the Spanish American War and the differences on the Niger and the Nile, had no prejudicial effect on the country's revenue the result for the year being a small surplus.

He estimated the expenditure for the coming year at £112,927,000, an increase of £6,098,000 over last year.

The total increase of expenditures during the last four years being no less than £19,096,000.

If this increase was to continue, the speaker pointed out, Parliament must agree to a large increase of taxation or discover new and productive sources of revenue, or the result would be a reaction against great expenditure, and he feared that such a reaction might impair the effective defensive services to a point in which they unhappily stood during last generation.

In conclusion, the Chancellor remarked, we are able to estimate a revenue of £111,157,000 to meet the expenditure of £110,927,000 leaving a surplus of £230,000.

The large expenditure is not due to an aggressive policy upon our part but has been forced upon us by increased and increasing armaments of others and in consideration of our unique naval prosperity and security.

Clarke, seconded by Dr. Hale, moved the following amendment; That this House deems it expedient to inform His Excellency that in view of the widespread charges of incompetency misconduct and corruption in the administration of public affairs connected with the Yukon it is the duty of the Government to appoint, without delay, an independent judicial commission to make a thorough investigation into that subject and report result.

### PEACE CONGRESS.

Italy, Not the Pope, has been Invited.

ROME, April 11.—Italy has been formally invited to the disarmament conference at the Hague, and has appointed as one of her delegates Marquis Visconti Venosta, Minister of Foreign Affairs in the late Rudini Cabinet. This is held to imply that the Vatican will not be invited to send a delegate.

### He Wouldn't Take of His Hat.

LONDON, April 12.—The Daily Mail publishes the following from Hong Kong: "Lieut. Col. G. F. Browne, military attaché of the British legation at Peking, was arrested for refusing to remove his hat while a religious procession was passing. The arrest was made at the instigation of the governor's nephew, Col. Browne was finally released on the demand of the British consul."

### For the Fair Sex.

TORONTO, April 12.—The Telegram's special cable from London says: The Times in an article to-day advocates the proposed establishment of a Women's Training Home in the Northwest Territories, and says the inauguration of the scheme would render service to the cause of imperial consolidation, and the substantial value of which would outlast more showy performances professing to further the same objects.
