Province. He told The Guardian he hoped to be able privately to have an opportunity of visiting at least one of the Island's lobster packing plants. Though the fishermen of his homeland caught excellent lobsters he knew nothing about the methods of processing them for future use. He would like to also observe the methods of catching them used here. At the same time he was profoundly impressed with the general agriculture of the Island as he observed it while travelling by train yesterday, and had many questions to ask concerning it.

Mr. Seth Govind Das, M. P. of India, was also observant of the agriculture and general appearance of prosperity here. He noted with envy that this Province was not overpopulated as is his native land.

The remark was concurred in by Mr. Jules Koenig, M. L. C. Maurillias, who noted that his little island was only half the size of this one with a population density of about 600 people to the square mile.

Of real assistance to the visitors in their efforts to get acquainted and learn something of this place were Mr. L. R. Beaudoin, M. P., Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons, Ottawa, and Mr. T. R. Montgomery, Liaison Officer with the group.

Special Service At O'Leary United

There were over five hundred people at the special service at the O'Leary United Church on Sunday night, August 31st, the annual W.M.S. thanksgiving service. Despite over 200 extra chairs, many were standing in the porch.

The minister, Rev. W. G. Dickson presided and cordially welcomed the large congregation and the guest speakers, Rev. Roy and Mrs. MacNaught and their adopted daughter, Miss Naya Diego.

The exhibition was officially opened at 2 p. m. by Lester Wallace, president of the Exhibition Association. Prominent speakers included Premier J. Walter Jones, Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, Senator George H. Barbour, J. W. Don Campbell, M.L.A., and Hon. J. Wilson MacNaught, M.P. The number of exhibits appeared somewhat smaller than usual but most were of good quality. They were the centre of interest for everyone.

A number of displays for advertising purposes also received their share of attention. The displays of machinery were more prominent than in previous years and much interest was shown in them. Of unusual interest were the plywood boats shown by Herbert Leavitt. The "Montrose Miss," a sport runabout, is finished in attractive coloring and features fittings of chromium plated brass, non-breakable windshield and automatic baler. Also shown were a small dory boat and a little fishing dory ideally suited for carrying atop a car.

Meals were served by the Western Hospital aid to approximately one thousand people. There were also treatment booths and amusements on the grounds. A large five tier cake, auctioned in aid of the Western Hospital was knocked down for a goodly sum. There was a marked decrease in entries of livestock this year but the quality exhibits was high.

Horses were judged by George Kitson who commended highly the type of stock shown and expressed regret that there was not more of it being raised. A special prize of \$100 was offered by Victor Campbell for the best foal of 1952 sired by Clairville. Ambition was won by Eldon Barbour. Champion mare in the carriage class was exhibited by Willard Coughlin and the champion percheron mare was shown by Charles Milligan. Champion stallion in the draft class was shown by Victor Campbell. First prize for a team of farm horses in harness, hitched to farm wagon, was won by Bert Pridham.

The largest exhibitor of Holstein cattle was James E. McNeill. Kensington. Other leading cattle exhibitors were Charles Taylor of Malpeque with his Ayrshires, McLean Home of Rosebank with Guernseys, Edwin Lord of Summerside with Jerseys, Loman McLean of Arlington with Shorthorns, Russell Rogers and Son of Coleman with dual purpose Shorthorns. No Herefords were shown. A new cattle class for red polls was added to the prize list this year. Prize winners in this class were George Miller and Arthur Miller, both of Northam.

The Bank of Commerce silver trophy for best dairy female at the show was awarded to Harold Palmer. Special prizes for calves were donated by Ralph Adams of O'Leary and Don Campbell of Alberton. In the sheep classes there was a noticeable decrease in the number of lambs shown. The quality of all exhibits was good. Principal exhibitors were Hudson Pridham with Shropshires, Raymond Shea with Oxford and Arnold Wood of O'Leary with Cheviots. Harry Pridham was the leading exhibitor of hares.

Poultry exhibits were good but few in number. A pair of fan tail pigeons created a centre of interest in the poultry building. Field roots and garden vegetables were of good quality for so dry a season. Some excellent collections of garden vegetables were shown and there were a large number of entries. First prize was won by Claude Lewis who also exhibited citron of unusual size. Special prizes for the best collections of fruit donated by C. R. Leard and Son were awarded to Alvin Webb and Mrs. Robert Oulton. In the flower exhibit some beautiful gladioli and roses were seen. Mrs. Alvin Webb won the J. W. Waugh prize. Among the potted plants a glorioxia owned by Mrs. Eric Corbett merits special mention.

Ladies' work and domestic science classes were judged by Miss Mary Robin, supervisor of women's classes, and her assistant, Mrs. Manning. In needlework they favored the plain and serviceable type and coloring that would blend with any surroundings.

The display of ladies work was large and workmanship of excellent quality. There were particularly good showings of quilts and hooked mats. Here again the judges showed a strong preference for soft colored tones. Knitting was up to the usual standard. The day concluded with a dance which was thoroughly enjoyed by a large crowd.
