

Tiger-Cats Blank Ottawa; Argonauts Smother Al's

Hamilton Tiger-Cats steamrolled the Ottawa Rough Riders 21-0 Saturday to move into a first-place tie in the Big Four Football League with Montreal Alouettes who suffered their first setback of the season, a 51-28 drubbing at the hands of Toronto Argonauts.

The weekend left Hamilton and Montreal with 3-1 win-loss records for six-point totals. The Argos and Rough Riders have two points apiece on the basis of 1-3 performances so far.

In the Western Interprovincial Football Union, the Grey Cup champion and League-leading Edmonton Eskimos went down to a merciless 31-4 drubbing before an aroused Saskatchewan Roughriders outfit performing at a full speed before a partisan crowd of 13,500.

At Vancouver, the British Columbia Lions held onto second place and a tie with Saskatchewan by defeating the Calgary Stampede 45-15 while 22,000 fans cheered quarterback Jerry Gustafson who scored the first B.C. touchdown and passed two others.

At Ottawa, costly Ottawa miscues resulted in three Hamilton touchdowns, two of them on passes by quarterbacks Nobby Winkowski and Ron Knox. The third Hamilton touchdown was on a 95-yard romp by Ray Truant who picked up an Ottawa lateral that went astray on the Hamilton 15.

Two interceptions of pass attempts by Ottawa quarterback Hal Ledyard, former San Francisco 49er, led to Hamilton touchdowns in the first quarter, one of which was converted by Steve Oneschuck.

The only second quarter scoring came when Cookie Glichrist tied a field goal from the Ottawa 30. The attempt was wide but Bobby Simpson was trapped behind the line for a rouge.

Truant's thrilling run, after Avatus Stone's wide lateral to Don Flaherty, resulted in a third-quarter touchdown. Cam Fraser kicked a single later in the quarter to make the score 21-0. There was no scoring in the last quarter.

At Toronto, the Argonauts combined brilliant passing by quarterback Arnold Galiffa and the power running of two halfbacks with an aggressive, hard-hitting defence to upset Alouettes.

It was Argonauts first victory over the Alouettes in two seasons. Galiffa, a cast-off from British Columbia Lions of the WIFU, threw five touchdown passes in leading the fired-up attack along with import halfback O. K. Ferguson from Louisiana State and homebrew backfielder Bobby Kuntz.

FROM BEHIND
A crowd of 20,952 in Varsity Stadium saw the Argos come from behind with two converted touchdowns in the third quarter and three more in the fourth to register their first league win in four Ottawa Rough Riders, knocked them into a third-place tie with the Alouettes. The victory, which moved the Alouettes from the unbeaten ranks and out of sole possession of first place. They now are tied with Hamilton Tiger-Cats for the league leadership with three wins and a loss each.

Galiffa, emergency replacement for injured quarterbacks Tom Dubinski and Gerry Doucette, fired two touchdown passes each to Bucky Curtis and Menan Schriener and one to Al Pfeiffer. Kuntz and Ferguson, getting great blocking from the Argo line and halfback Dick Shatto, went over for their other touchdowns. Mike Falls converted six of the seven touchdowns and Bart Moll kicked a 33-yard field goal to account for Argos' other points.

Fob James, playing his first league game for the Alouettes, scored two touchdowns on pitch-outs. Quarterback Sam Etcheverry threw touchdown passes to Hal Patterson and George Brancato. Bill Bewley kicked the conversion.

With the value of a touchdown counting six points this season, the total of 79 points set a modern Big Four record for the greatest number in a game. The old mark of 75 was set in a 42-33 Ottawa victory over Montreal in 1949.

WIFU ACTION
In the WIFU, Saskatchewan Roughriders, undefeated at home, romped over Edmonton's Eskimos 31-4 to explode the invincible Jackie Parker myth and hand the Grey Cup champions their first defeat in five games.

Brilliant passing by Frank Trtupka, former Notre Dame quarterback, who pitched for one touchdown and set up two others with accurate forwards, and solid work by the Rider linemen mates in check and give Eskimos their worst defeat in years.

A crowd of 13,500 jammed into Taylor Field to watch Riders whip the Eskimos in every department as Saskatchewan won its third straight home game to stay in a second-place tie with British Columbia Lions with a 3-3 record. Eskimos remain in first place with a 4-1 mark.

Ken Carpenter, the league-leading scorer last year, scored two Saskatchewan touchdowns with halfback Jon McWilliams, former university of Nebraska back, and Larry Isbell each getting one. Reg Whitehouse converted the four touchdowns and kicked a field goal.

Bob Dean, University of Mary-

land tackle brought this week from the reserve list to replace injured fullback Johnny Bright on the import list, scored all Edmonton points with a single on his opening kickoff and a second-quarter field goal.

GUSTAFSON SHINES
Jerry Gustafson, latest entry in the B.C. Lions quarterback stakes, also proved to be the best as he guided the club to a runaway 45-15 win over Calgary Stampede before 22,737 fans in Vancouver.

The victory, first in four starts for Lions and their third in six scheduled games, put them in a second-place tie with Roughriders with six points. Calgary remained in the league cellar with one victory.

Gustafson, former Stanford signal caller who came to Vancouver after failing to make the San Francisco 49ers, had able assistance from the rest of the team, especially pass-catching end Dan Edwards and defensive end Rae Ross, a Vancouver boy.

The quarterback scored one touchdown himself and passed to for two others. Ross picked up a fumble by Calgary quarterback Don Klosterman to score one touchdown and collected six more points after intercepting a Klosterman pass.

Glen Christian and Ed Vereb scored the others.

Both Calgary touchdowns were scored by Earl Lunsford. Al Polard converted one B.C. touchdown and Tony Teresa converted two, while Klosterman added the extra point to both Calgary touchdowns. The Calgary quarterback also kicked a single in the first quarter.

Ken Rosewall Turns Back Lew Hoad

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP)—Ken Rosewall blasted the "grand slam" hopes of fellow Australian Lew Hoad and a 16-year dream came true for Shirley Fry of the U.S. Sunday in the finals of the diamond jubilee U.S. tennis championships.

Stunning a crowd of 12,000 who came out in 58-degree, topcast temperatures to watch Hoad try to duplicate Don Budge's great four-tournament sweep of 1938, the little, black-haired Rosewall cut down his heavily-favored boyhood chum and Davis Cup teammate with almost faultless accuracy for the men's title, 4-6, 6-2, 6-3, 6-3.

Hoad, a handsome youngster of 21 with a strange temperament and shots that go like cannon balls, had won the Australian, Wimbledon and French championships. He beat Rosewall in the finals of the first two of these, and needed only the U.S. title as a ticket to a \$100,000 professional contract. But his crumpling power was the toy of Rosewall's rare all-around court wizardry.

Earlier, Miss Fry, an intense, 29-year-old Akron, Ohio girl making her 16th bid in the tournament, added the U.S. women's title to her Wimbledon triumph by vanquishing flittery off-form Althea Gibson of New York, 6-3, 6-4.

Piecesoflight, son of Mr. Busher, captured the \$40,175 Boardwalk Handicap at Atlantic City.

The victory in Del Mar's major race, limited to two-year-olds, was worth \$34,900 to Ross and Slipstein, owners of Swirling Abbey.
