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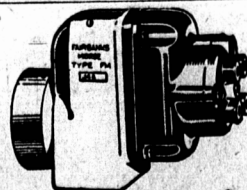

The Montague Meteors won the first game of the intermediate hockey semi-finals last night by defeating the Georgetown Eagles 8-1 at the Georgetown rink. The final game is scheduled to take place in Montague on Friday night, and judging from the performance put on last night it promises to be some game.

In another semi-final series last night Morell scored a close 3-2 victory over Souris in a game played at Souris.

The Meteors opened the first period with a sustained attack, mowing down the opposition, and putting Jay in position, where on a corner drive he opened the scoring at the 1:05 mark. It was almost impossible to complete passes on the slushy ice, but a long pass out from the defence zone set up the next play when Power scored on a breakaway from a corner pass from MacLean. Buffeted from all sides by the Meteors, the Eagles found it tough going to get near the net, but Stevens worked in close, and on a pass from MacDonald slipped one around Walper for their one and only score.

In the second session the game got faster and rougher, with both teams handing out heavy body checks in centre ice and along the boards, which on several occasions brought the fans to their feet with excitement as several near lights developed, going to the end with several minutes of the play. After three minutes of play, the Meteors went on the attack, and after leaving several opponents behind Langigan fast skated around one opposing defenceman, passed it to MacLean, who banged it in the net. Seven minutes later on a long pass from the defence zone to the red line Power picked up the puck, and outskating the defence, shot a corner drive that dented the twines for another goal.

- 2-What is the name of each employee employed in each of the three counties in 1949 and 1950?
- 3-What was the total amount of pounds of all species and value of fish caught in each of the three counties for the years 1949 and 1950?

New Method Of Teaching History In Island Schools

A new and easy way of teaching history in Prince Edward Island has been developed by the Visual Education Division of the Provincial Department of Education. It is a departure from the old text book routine and combines illustrations with contemporary happenings in other parts of the world to tell the story of the province since its founding.

The lessons are simple and direct. They are printed in large letters on a three-panel cardboard upright which folds neatly and can be circulated easily from school to school. When set up, it has a stage effect - floor and all. The floor contains a map which is used to trace the story in the unit. Each lesson is called a unit and there are 16 in all.

This particular series - the first - deals with the development of communications in the Province. Unit No. 1 deals with the discovery of the Island. The discovery itself is told in story and picture on the panel to the left. The middle

and right side panels record, also in story and illustrations, contemporary happenings in other parts of the world - particularly the progress being made in the arts and sciences.

In each unit there is a folder contained in a side pocket which gives helpful instructions for the teacher as aids in teaching the material presented in each unit.

Unit No. 2 deals with the French Regime and No. 3 deals with the period when Prince Edward Island became a British Colony. Some of the phases dealt with in that section include the establishment of a government, and the first winter crossing of the Northumberland Strait with mail.

By Unit No. 4 the teacher has taken her pupils right into the communications of the province - an ever important topic in the history and development of the Island. This unit deals with the institution of a postal service.

The following units are entitled: The advent of Steamships; Conversations through the Sea (Submarine Cable); Living by Gaslight; Railways; Conversations through the Air (Telephone); Electricity; Printing Progresses; The Gasoline Motor; Music in the Air (Introduction of radios); Travel by Air; Television (when it is likely to come to Prince Edward Island); Sum-

mary of Communication Developments. The visual education division refers to the project as an exhibition and received many of the illustrations for it from the Public Archives of Canada. Actual work on the Exhibition was done by Miss Frances Johnston.

"Social evolution may form the background of this exhibition, for change in social attitudes and behaviour accompanied the growth of communication systems," said Miss Johnston in describing the new method.
