

### King's County Fishermen Away To Good Start

\*Almost all lines were run Saturday and yesterday as lobster fishermen set out under clear skies to open another fishing season. The two days were almost perfect for the work with light winds on the east and south shores. On the north shore, however, stronger winds prevailed and slowed operations to some extent. All fishing areas were ice free and lines were run without difficulty or mishap. Fishermen took the opportunity to set out traps, and almost all have half or more of their traps out. The first haul will be made today but the big haul will not be until probably Wednesday when all traps will be in the water and fishing.

It was reported yesterday that one fisherman had two lobsters in a trap which had been out for a half hour. Fishermen think this is an indication of a good catch this year. No prices are as yet being quoted, but it is rumored that the starting price may settle around twenty to twenty-two cents for canners, and twenty-three to twenty-five for market, provided there is a ready market available.

### Diem Emerges Victor In So. Viet Nam Power Fight

SAIGON, South Viet Nam. (AP)—Premier Ngo Dinh Diem emerged the victor Sunday from a hectic scramble for power. An attempted coup by a backer of chief of state Bao Dai collapsed and left Diem still head of the beleaguered government of South Viet Nam.

The Vietnamese army—which for a few hours took orders from his opponent, Gen. Nguyen Van Vy—returned to Diem's camp and pledged complete loyalty to him. Vy, deserted by even his personal guard, fled to Dai, 240 miles northeast of Saigon, apparently surrendering the pretensions to "supreme power" which he proclaimed in an attempted coup d'etat earlier in the day.

Diem, firmly in control again, sent a message to Bao Dai—who has been attempting to impose his will by remote control from the French Riviera—advising him to annul orders naming Vy commander of the army and to withdraw his summons of a conference in France May 5 to choose a new government.

**DENOUNCE BAO DAI**

The national revolutionary committee, a congress of 18 political parties and 35 Vietnamese leaders, denounced Bao Dai Saturday night as a despicable French puppet and announced he was being deposed as chief of state. The committee has no actual governmental power, however. Its function seems largely advisory.

Diem has its action under consideration but has not announced any decision.

"Bao Dai doesn't come to his senses," a spokesman said, "the decisions of the national revolutionary committee deposing him may have to be considered seriously."

From Cannes, where Bao Dai lives in luxurious security, far from his country's turmoil, the emperor cabled Diem Sunday that he was interested only in avoiding civil war and getting a government with a broad popular base.

VIENNA (Reuters)—The first group of 15 Austrian prisoners-of-war and civil internees to be returned from Russia since the Soviet government's recent promise to release all Austrians still in their hands arrived here by train Friday. The agreement to return Austrian prisoners is one of the Soviet concessions under the peace treaty settlement now pending.

MONTREAL (CP)—A Canadian planted tree from Montreal will be planted in Wageningen, Holland, May 5, to mark the 10th anniversary of the liberation of The Netherlands by Canadian troops. Six maple sugar saplings will be flown to Holland for the ceremony by Royal Dutch Airlines.

### New Series Boy Scout Badges

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's 175,000 Boy Scouts have a new series of proficiency badges to try for. They are aimed at encouraging observation of natural resources. The executive committee of the Canadian General Council of Boy Scouts Saturday created four badges, one each for forestry, wildlife, water and soil conservation. They will be put up for competition next year.

The committee, concluding a two-day meeting here of senior scout leaders from Newfoundland to British Columbia, also decided to initiate a cyclist's badge for Wolf Cubs. It will be available for cubs who learn to care for their bicycles and to follow safe rules on the road.

The delegates decided, too, to increase Canada's representation at the 8th world jamboree at Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont., next August to 4,000 from 3,500.
