War, Rail Strike Topped Busy Year In Federal House

By George Kitchin (Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, Dec. 15 (CP) — Canada's political pulse quickened again in 1950.

Parliament met twice, once in the regular spring session and again in a special emergency session called to settle the domestic railway strike crisis and to authorize the raising of troops for Korea or elsewhere.

Four major Federal-Provincial conferences were held, three in Ottawa and one in Quebec, as representatives of Canada's 11 governments tussled with the tough economic and constitutional problems facing the country.

Nine Federal by-elections called during the year resulted in the loss of four Commons seats to the Liberals. Two went to the Progressive Conservative and two to the Independent-Liberal column.

At the year end, the House standing Liberals 185; Progressive Conservatives 43; C. C. F. 13; Social Credit 10; Independents, five; Independent-Liberals, four; vacancies, two; total 262.

The contests were in the ridings of Halifax, Annapolis-Kings, Montreal St. Mary, Montreal Carier, Rimouski, Joliette-L'Assomption, Montclair, Toronto Broadview, Hamilton West and Welland.

The two vacancies still unfilled, in the Manitoba riding of Brandon and the Prince Edward Island seat of Queen's, were created by deaths of the sitting members, both Liberals.

Senate Appointments

There were three Senate appointments, leaving 14 vacancies at the year-end. The new senators are Dr. Vincent P. Burke, educationist from St. John's, Nfld., Gordon Isnor, Halifax merchant and former Liberal member of the Commons for Halifax, and Charles B. Hawkins, lumberman from Milford Station, N. S.

Cabinet changes were relatively few. Veterans Minister Gregg was appointed Labor Minister to succeed Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, who died suddenly in August. Mr. Gregg's portfolio went to solicitor-general Lapointe and Justice Minister Gougeon assumed the solicitor-generalship.

The spring session of parliament, running from Feb. 18 to June 30, generally featured domestic legislation and a Federal budget which left taxes pretty much unchanged.

Then came the worsening Korean situation and parliament met again from Aug. 29 to Sept. 15 to approve the raising of the special brigade, authorize new defence expenditures, boost taxes and grant the government certain emergency powers in the defence production field.

The Federal-Provincial conferences dealt with domestic issues. Three of them—two in Ottawa and one in Quebec—were aimed at devising a satisfactory method of amending the Canadian constitution while the fourth, in Ottawa, dealt with financial relationships between the Federal and Provincial Governments.

In the non-political sphere, the term of Viscount Alexander was extended for another year. His five-year term was to have expired in the spring of 1951.

Sumner H. Cobbett Retired C. G. Officer Dies at Scituate, Mass.

Many Island friends will regret to learn of the death of Sumner H. Cobbett, 54, retired Coast Guard ensign and captain of the Scituate Coast Guard station when it was opened in the late 1930's, died Nov. 23 at his home, 40 Beaver Dam Road, Scituate Harbor, after a long illness. He was the husband of Mrs. Eva J. (Arthur) Cobbett.

Born in Hanover, the son of the late James Arthur and Lizzie H. (Winslow) Cobbett, Mr. Cobbett joined the Coast Guard at the age of 21 at North Scituate, and served as a captain at stations in Scituate, Gurnet Point in Plymouth, Point Allerton in Hull, Manomet Point, Rockport and Boston, retiring in Boston on Dec. 21, 1943.

Since his retirement, he had been a lobster fisherman in Scituate. He was a member of Scituit Masonic lodge of Scituate, the Massachusetts Consistory of Boston, Aleppo Temple of Boston, and the South Shore Lobster Fishermen's Association.

In addition to his wife, Mr. Cobbett is survived by twin daughters, Priscilla and Phyllis, of the home address, one daughter, Mrs. David F. Anderson of Scituate, and one brother, Irving B.
