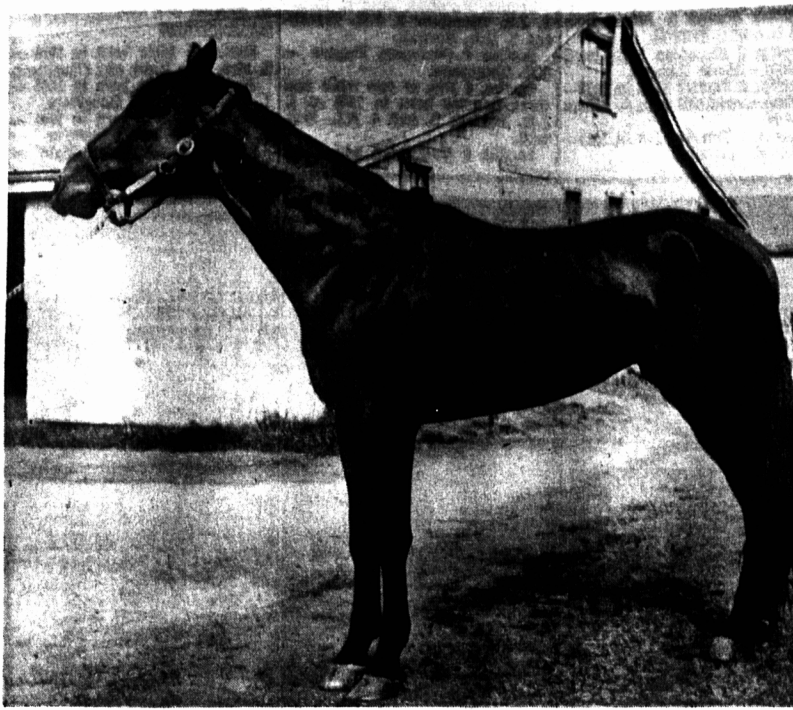


# Newport Chief Clocked In 2:05 Saturday Afternoon

Newport Chief, a black horse owned by Bert C. Cruikshanks of Halifax and driven by Buddy Cruikshanks, raced three of the fastest miles ever seen at the Charlottetown Driving Park Saturday afternoon and in the first mile he shattered the long-standing track record when he blazed down the stretch to be clocked in 2.05 which chopped a half second off the old mark.

Chief swept all three heats of the Free-For-All and each time ran away from the rest of the field to win easily. The second mile was in 2.05 3-5 and the third was 2.05 2-5.

The old mark of 2:05 1-2 was set back in 1936 by Bud Wenger and for 20 years stood up to repeated assaults by some of the finest race horses from the Maritimes and eastern U.S.

The other races during the afternoon and evening season were more or less anticlimactic after Newport Chief's record-breaking feat.

On the afternoon card Little Delbert topped two heats of the C. Pace while J.W. Abbe took the other. Rubison Clegg and Vera Signal split heats of the DD Pace.

**NIGHT CARD**

Singing Sword, ANN C. and Taurida Bay were all double dash winners on the night card. April Bud and Scotland's Ace divided dashes of the Classified Trot.

In the opening heat of the Free-For-All the heavy favorite Convar got away to a shaky start and trailed the other four horses all the way around to finish a poor last.

Josedale Clansmen hopped into the lead from the start and zoomed by the quarter pole in 31 seconds. Ann's Dream then took over the lead at the half-way mark but as the horses were coming around the lower turn Cruikshanks made his move with Newport Chief and ripped by the field as if they were standing still. The black horse opened up a big lead and as he came thundering into the stretch the crowd—4,000 strong—sensing a new record rose on its feet and sent Newport Chief winging home with lusty cheers and hand-clapping.

The times of the quarters were M: 1:02 2-5; 1:34 2-5.

**PROVEN NO FLUKE**

To prove his victory was no fluke Newport Chief won the next two heats in almost identical fashion, each time staying back in the pack until near the 3/4 mark and flying by to win by 4 lengths.

For accomplishing this feat Buddy Cruikshanks was presented with a check for \$100 by H.J. Kennedy, President of the Provincial Exhibition Association on behalf of the Association during the night card.

The Daily Double in the afternoon on Little Delbert and Newport Chief paid a whopping \$482.50 and the one in the evening on G. Ann C. and April Bud paid \$40.50.

## British Rifle Shooter Wins Governor-General's Match

**SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—**A 55-year-old member of the British rifle team Saturday walked off with the coveted Governor-General's Gold Medal at the annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

Dr. J. P. Michael, short, pipe-smoking major from Cornwall, England, paced a field of 300 competitors. He chalked up a score of 196 of a possible 200, firing 10 rounds from 300 yards and 15 each from 600 and 900 yards at Connaught rifle ranges.

Dr. Michael was chaired at the firing point after being mobbed by other members of the British team and Canadian marksmen and was carried to the presentation stand behind a band from the governor-general's Foot Guards. He received the coveted gold medal from Lt.-Gen. H. D. Graham, chief of the general staff.

**CANADIAN RUNNERS-UP**

Dr. Michael, a veteran of years of international competition, said after the match was decided that he never won anything like it before.

"I feel real good," he said. "I had no idea that my score would be the best. In all the time I have been shooting, I have never won anything like this before."

Three Canadian marksmen finished in runner-up spot, posting a score of 198—five points off the possible. They were WO2 J. R. Sullivan of Saint John, N.B., and Toronto, now stationed with the 1st Canadian Air Division at Gros Ventre, France; RCMP Sgt. E. C. Armstrong of Ottawa, and C. Armstrong of Riverview, N.B., now stationed with the 1st Canadian Air Division at Gros Ventre, France.

A total of 25 marksmen, including one woman, scored possible

in the first round of the match. Mrs. Theresa Hughes of Newcastle, N.B., was the only woman to score a possible 50 in the 300-yard round.

Others scoring possibilities included: Sgt. A. S. Emery, Saint John, N.B.; WO1 P. A. Thompson, Sydney, N.S.; Cadet D. F. Bertelsen, Grand Falls, N.B.; and PO J. B. Baker, Pictou, N.S.

**NAME HISLEY TEAM**

The make-up of Canada's 18-man team that will compete at Bisley, England, next summer also was decided Saturday. Top aggregate standings during the week-long shoot are added to the scores posted in the final stage of the Governor-General's match and the top 18 are selected to represent Canada.

Lieut. George Hogue of Montreal, a member of the Black Watch of Canada Association, topped first place in the Bisley aggregate with a combined score of 847. Sgt. R. B. Cathline of Camp Borden, Ont., and J. A. Marshall of Pictou, N.S., tied for runner-up place with scores of 841.

**VICTORIA (CP)—** Two swimmers crossed the Strait of Juan de Fuca Saturday but both landed short of the attempted goal of Victoria.

Mrs. Amy Hiland, a housewife from Long Beach, Calif., landed at William Head, six miles southwest of Victoria, at 3:36 p.m. PDT after 10 hours and 51 minutes in the water. She is the first woman to swim the strait.

Ben Laughren, Victoria chef, landed at Church Point at 3:12 p.m. PDT. He had been in the water 10 hours, 17 minutes. His landing point was 10 miles southwest of Victoria.

Both swimmers entered the water at Port Angeles, Wash., Mrs. Hiland at 4:45 a.m. and Laughren 15 minutes later. They were swept west by their courses on an unfavorable ebb tide but managed to regain ground on a flood tide later.

Mrs. Hiland swam 20 miles to complete the crossing and Laughren swam 21.

**Braves Maintain Lead As Dodgers Move Into Second**

Milwaukee's Braves edged into a two-game lead in the tight National League race as home runs by Ed Mathews and Hank Aaron backed up Warren Spahn's eight-hitter to defeat Cincinnati 3-1 Sunday. The loss skidded the Redlegs back to third place with Brooklyn taking over the runner-up spot on a 3-1 victory over Philadelphia.

Aaron's homer, his 18th, got the job done, coming with a man on in the eighth off Tom Acker. The young righthander had given the Braves just two hits until the eighth after coming on in the first when starter Joe Nuxhall was sidelined by Danny O'Connell's line drive.
