# Kensington Handicraft Centre Shows Profit

KENSINGTON — "I see no reason why it cannot be made on a good job, for selling on permanent business," was the opinion expressed by E.C. Moore, secretary of the Kensington Handicraft Centre, which sponsors the Tourist Bureau at Kensington, and assists financially with the handicraft center.

Mr. Moore was speaking at a meeting of ladies representing the institute and other producers in the area which supplies the center with hand-made goods for sale during the summer months.

He gave an encouraging view of the financial situation in the fact that in the past year the center made a small profit while in the previous year, the first in the venture, the commission for sales failed to meet expenses.

The speaker, in commenting on the 20 per cent commission charged suppliers for selling their goods, said that he had made inquiries a various handicraft outlets, and found that 30 and one-third per cent is the minimum charge, with as high as 50 per cent.
