SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Great Skating Match.

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 2. The first of a series of skating matches between Axel Paulsen, of this city, and Hugh J. McCormack, of St. John, N. B., came off yesterday afternoon before a large audience. McCormack trailed Paulsen the entire distance until the last lap. Then he spurted, gaining ten yards, when a chair thrown across the track caused him to sustain a terrible fall. He regained his feet and attempted to overtake Paulsen, but the latter won by a couple of feet. A protest was entered against paying over the stake money, \$250, but it was understood to-night that the protest has been withdrawn and the money will be paid over to Paulsen. Time for five miles, 20 min. 18 sec; ten miles, 40 min. 55 sec., fifteen miles, 1 hr. 1 min. 37 sec.

Archbishop Cleary Heard From.

OTTAWA, Jan. 2. Archbishop Cleary, of Kingston, published to-day another letter in reply to Mr. Meredith, in which he points out that the policy of the Conservative party involves oppression of the Catholics of Ontario, but adds that the Catholics have confidence in the spirit of wisdom and justice of their Protestant fellow-countrymen who rebuked so severely the appeals to fanaticism and its followers at the last Provincial election.

Caved In.

WILKESBARRE, Jan. 2. About two hundred feet of track of the Delaware, Lakawana & Western Railway caved in at Plymouth this afternoon. The cave-in extended to the Episcopal Church building, which is not yet damaged. The entire territory surrounding it is unmined. Large gangs of men are at work propping the interior of the mine. All miners have quit work.

Destroyed by Fire.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2. The downtown shops of the Edison Electric Illumination Company, Pearl Street, were burned this morning. The station supplied 18,000 incandescent lights in the downtown district, most of which burn all day in banks and offices below Fulton St. The fire gutted the building 255 and 257 Pearl Street, and caused a loss to Edison of \$100,000. Insurance \$50,000.

Electing School Trustees.

TORONTO, Jan. 2. Separate school trustees were elected yesterday. An unusual interest was taken in the election on account of the ballot controversy, the candidates being in most cases ballot and anti-ballot men. The Catholic clergy opposed the idea of having trustees elected by ballot, and the friends of that method of voting were all defeated.

Steamer Ashore.

LONDON, Jan. 2. The Italian steamer Persia is ashore on the Island of Corsica. She had 139 passengers on board when she went ashore. Six of them have been rescued, but the fate of the others is uncertain. Boats from the shore are attempting to reach the vessel to render assistance.

Rubber Trust.

TRENTON, N. Y., Jan. 2. Negotiations which have been in progress for some time with a view to the establishment of a rubber trust in this city have been about completed. British capitalists, it is said, are to take an interest amounting to about \$3,000,000, and will push the stock in England and Scotland.

Foreign Relations.

LISBON, Jan. 2. At the opening of the Cortes to-day the King announced that the foreign relations of the Kingdom were all that could be desired. He reviewed the progress in the African Colonies of Portugal. He made reference to the disputes with England.

Personal.

OTTAWA, Jan. 2. Dr. Bourinot, Clerk of the House of Commons, yesterday received official intimation that he had been created a Companion of the order of St. Michael and St. George. Wm. Welsh, Member for Queen's, P. E. I., is in the city.

An Untrue Report.

TORONTO, Jan. 2. A special cablegram from London says: I state on the best of authority that there is no foundation for the rumor that the Government has the dissolution of Parliament under consideration.

News From Brazil.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2. The steamer Lisbonese has arrived here from Bahia. She reports that up to the date of sailing, Dec. 21, everything was peaceful in Brazil.
