## Exhibition Grounds To Close To Prevent Display Damage

The provincial exhibition grounds, including the coliseum, the cattle barns and the racing paddock area, will be closed to the public Sunday prior to the opening of this year's exhibition, it has been announced by the exhibition association president, R. Allison Profit.

Mr. Profit explained that over the years, incidents of vandalism have occurred at the coliseum and cattle barns on the Sunday prior to the opening of the exhibition. This has necessitated the closing of these places to the public on Sunday for the first time this year, he said, and they have license to sell goods.

Mr. Profit said that the coliseum however will be open over the weekend to exhibitors and their families.

An additional reason for the Sunday closing of the coliseum and the racing paddock area is to prevent damage to the exhibits, said Mr. Profit. In addition fires were also started at and plywood paneling smashed.

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In the evening a delightful program was presented by the Charlottetown Centennial Majorettes and the Charlottetown Youth Chorus.

**TODAY'S PROGRAM**  
The program of judging will include dairy cattle, sheep, horses and pig steers. The feature is the parade performance by the sky divers. At 7 p.m. there will be a live-telecast of the parade followed by an entertainment by local talent and the Royal Canadian Dragoon Band from Ottawa.

An RCMP car led the parade today at 10 a.m. followed by a band. It was followed by the Charlottetown Centennial Majorettes, the Pipe Band and Majorettes. Then came the floats — one with models of the historic Provincial Building and the new Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building, depicting the cradle of confederation; one indicating Summerside as the "Pearl of P.E.I.," the Clover Farm one which showed Jacques Cartier first sighting this province in 1534; Holman's, established in 1857, indicating 54,276,640 minutes of shopping satisfaction; one by Lucky Dollar stores from which bags of potato chips were thrown to onlookers; the Rex and Weeks feed-mob; a Massey-Ferguson one sponsored by Ken Ramsay and son; Alberton Fire Department driven by Dean Campbell; one from the forestry department urging that the fire be kept green; one sponsored by Allied Youth; one by Alberton industries and at the end, perhaps the most interesting of all — a lady and gentleman of the past century riding in a horse drawn buggy. Their names, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Shaw of Bloomfield. At the end of the parade was a young lady on horseback.

**Hydrant Hit After Blowout**  
SUMMERSIDE — A fire hydrant on Main Street here was badly damaged when hit by a 1960 compact driven by Peter Dandy MacIntyre, Souris, early Monday morning.

The accident occurred at 2.30 a.m. when MacIntyre's vehicle reportedly went out of control because of a blowout. Damage to the car was estimated at \$200.

The injured man is Ralph Arsenault of Mont Carmel and his condition was reported last evening by the Prince County Hospital as being unchanged. His condition was described as critical on admission and he is still unconscious. Mr. Arsenault is believed to have suffered a fractured skull and serious injuries to his neck and ribs.

The injured man is 26 years old, married, and has four small children. He is a bricklayer and cement contractor in the Mont Carmel area. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Arsenault of 63 East Street in Summerside.

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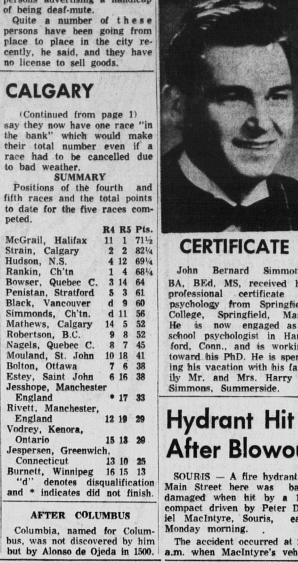
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
