Convicted Man Said Psychopath

Two psychiatrists in Supreme Court yesterday testified that Merlin Maurice Murphy, convicted of rape on January 17, was a criminal sexual psychopath. In view of this evidence presented by the Attorney General's Department sentence, which was to have been imposed on the accused, was post at 10:30 a.m.

Both doctors A.A. MacVicar and John C. Theriault of the Department of Mental Health said that Murphy came under the category described above. Dr. Theriault had examined him on two occasions and Dr. MacVicar examined him on Sunday morning last.

Also testifying to the condition of the accused was his wife who stated that they had been married for ten years. Her husband joined the Canadian Army about four years after their marriage and served for two and a half years in Korea. On his return from Korea, he joined a patrol outfit and while training in Alberta injured his head in a parachute jump.

Questioned by defence counsel, Mr. J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. Mrs. Murphy said that she had noticed a tendency in her husband to "chase young girls" after he had received the injury to his head. She said that previous to this time he had shown no inclination to behave in this manner.

Mr. Campbell said that from correspondence with the warden of Dorchester Penitentiary he was informed that the institution provided no facilities for treatment of psychiatric patients. He suggested to the court that some attempt should be made to ascertain where such treatment could be obtained.

He agreed that the prisoner would have to be sentenced to Dorchester in the first place but felt that a recommendation for some form of treatment should be included which would probably involve his transfer to another institution at a later date.

More Capital Must Go Into Canadian Economy, Mr. Harris

"Canada's economy requires a greater expenditure capital than even the United States. We are developing and strengthening our influence not only with the United States but with all our Allies," the Hon. Walter Harris, Minister of Finance said at a Rotary Luncheon held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday, at which His Honour Lieutenant Governor Prowse, an honorary member, was present.

Mr. Harris described the routine of his Department and the necessary steps leading to collecting and distributing the revenue of the country. In October and November, the Treasury Board deals with prospective spending, which shows up in the Blue Book of estimates about a month after Parliament opens. "While it is literally true that many millions are rushed through in the dying days of parliament, it is not in fact," the Minister said. "After the estimates have been in the hands of the members for five months, they have been culled over and present no particular reason for criticism at the time."

He described the functions of the Controller General, without whose approval no cheque can be issued. Frequently the discovery is made that an unauthorized item appears, and must be struck out.

DELEGATIONS HEARD

In an endeavour to remove discrimination, delegations are constantly heard with deep interest on many subjects. "It is the duty of the Finance Minister to balance all

these reports and with the good of the Nation uppermost in mind, recognize and adhere to priorities.

"It is he who must collect and use monies in the interest of all Canadian people."

FORESEES GREAT

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Dealing again with Opposition criticism that the Federal Parliament was not being conducted on a democratic basis, Mr. Harris said that there never was a session when the Opposition did not have sufficient time to discuss all matters in the House; there never was a time when the estimates were not presented to the House at least within five or six weeks of the opening of parliament.

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He said that when he reduced taxes in last year's budget he was criticized for this action because the country could not warrant a reduction in its budget. "I was accused of engaging in unorthodox practices," he said. "On the other hand there were those who said that we failed to reduce the taxes enough." He described such criticism as "words without meaning."

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
