Paving Contract In Bonshaw Area Is Completed

The first contract for paving on the Trans-Canada Highway in this province has been finished. It has been learned from the contractors, Curran and Briggs Ltd. Consisting of about nine and a half miles, the new pavement commences at Bonshaw and extends to about two miles beyond the village of Crapaud. Missing is a half-mile section of new road where the highway avoids Crapaud village. This could not be done this year as a new bridge is being built. This is the only contract for hard surface that has yet been let on this new highway. Curran and Briggs Ltd. have commenced paving a section of the main highway between New Annapolis and Kensington. The original pavement on this road was torn up last year as it had suffered a large amount of frost and other damage. At the same time the road was re-routed to avoid two railway crossings. Last winter and spring it was almost impassable at times and the work of hard paving is a welcome sight to motorists. At the same time preparatory work for paving is going on at a three mile stretch of the main highway between Wilmot and North Bedouque. This was likewise torn up and regraded last summer after it had broken up. When these two stretches are paved it will mean that there will again be a completely paved road connecting Borden, Summerside and Charlottetown, although quite a bit of the old pavement is very rough.
