On that occasion it is intended to form a Committee of gentlemen to devise the best means for providing a suitable building for the institution; and who will at a later day wait upon the Government with a view to securing an annual grant for its maintenance. To better promote the formation of such a committee, Colonel Gray, as Chairman of the preliminary meeting, advised that the ladies of the committee should specially invite the Clergy, the members of the Bench and the Bar, and also His Worship the Mayor, to condescend, by their presence on that occasion, the work in hand.

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY.—The semi-annual public meeting of the Charlotteville Conference of this Society was held yesterday evening in St. Patrick's Hall. The reports of the officers showed the receipts for the past six months to be \$538.92, and the expenditure \$531.12, being an increase of about sixty dollars over the expenditure for the corresponding period of 1880-1. Last winter was one of unusual depression, and consequently the Conference was taxed to its utmost to meet the numerous calls for assistance. It is to be regretted that the revenue does not increase proportionately with the expenditure. The members, however, are in no way discouraged, but urged on to greater exertions in their noble work. At the close of the meeting the Spiritual Director, Rev. Father McGillivray, took occasion to express his thanks for the liberal aid given the Society by all denominations. It is to be hoped that at the next meeting he will have cause to return even greater thanks, for such institutions deserve encouragement and support. From the report for the year 1881 of the President of the Superior Council of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul in Canada, to which the Charlotteville Conference is affiliated, we quote the following:—Receipts, \$31,532.46; expenditure, \$24,831.67; active members, 3,310; honorary members, 152; candidates for admission, 28; benefactors, 281; admitted during year, 512.

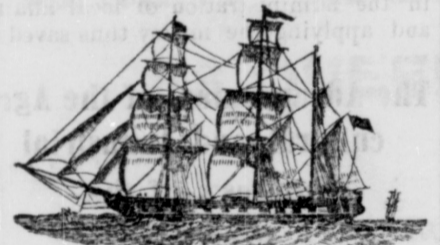
