Heavy Docket in Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

Some 15 cases were heard before Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald yesterday afternoon. Court adjourned until Oct. 7.

A resident of Hopfield, charged under the Temperance Act with unlawfully having liquor in his possession in a place other than his residence, pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 and costs of \$2.50 or 30 days in King's County Jail at Georgetown.

A resident of Alberry Plains, facing the same charge as in the first case, pleaded guilty and was fined \$20, costs of \$4.50 or 30 days in jail.

A resident of Milltown Cross, charged under the Criminal Code of Canada with unlawfully causing damage to a car window to the extent of \$7.00, had a plea of guilty entered by the Crown Prosecutor and ordered to make restitution of the damage to the amount of \$14.00, or 10 days in jail.

A resident of Alliston appeared, charged under section 291 of the Criminal Code of Canada, that he unlawfully did assault a woman resident of Alliston by striking her with his fist in the face. A plea of not guilty was entered. The informant and the defendant each gave evidence and each put one witness on the stand. The case was adjourned until Oct. 7 at 2:30 at Georgetown.

A resident of Murray River had his brother appear for him and enter a plea of guilty on his behalf on a charge of unlawfully operating a truck, which weighed in excess of 5,000 pounds, on a highway at a speed in excess of 30 miles per hour, contrary to the Highway Traffic Act. He was fined \$20 and costs of \$2.50 or 30 days in jail.

A resident of Murray Harbor had his employer appear and enter a plea of guilty on his behalf on a charge of unlawfully operating a truck weighing in excess of 5,000 pounds at a speed in excess of 30 miles per hour. He was fined \$20 and costs of \$2.50 or 30 days in jail.

The same resident of Murray Harbor had a plea of guilty entered on his behalf to a charge that he unlawfully did operate a motor vehicle on a public highway without first obtaining a license for the current year. He was fined \$1.00 and costs of \$2.00 or five days in jail.

A resident of Charlottetown, pleaded guilty to a charge of unlawfully allowing an unlicensed person to operate a motor vehicle, owned by the defendant, on a highway, contrary to the Highway Traffic Act. The case was withdrawn.

A resident of Montague pleaded guilty having liquor in his possession in a place other than his residence, contrary to the Temperance Act. He was fined \$20 and costs of \$4.50 or 30 days in jail.

A resident of St. Peter's Bay, charged under the Highway Traffic Act with unlawfully driving a truck weighing in excess of 5,000 pounds on the highway in excess of 30 miles per hour pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 and costs of \$2.50 or 30 days in jail.

A resident of Georgetown pleaded guilty to a charge of moving a building on a public highway without first obtaining a permit

from the Minister of Public Works. The case was adjourned until Saturday, Oct. 7.

A resident of Queen's Road charged under the Highway Traffic Act that he did allow an unlicensed person to operate a motor vehicle, owned by the defendant, on a highway, pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 and costs of \$2.50 or 10 days in jail.

A resident of Montague, charged under the Criminal Code with unlawfully driving a motor vehicle in a reckless manner on the public highway, pleaded guilty. The same party also pleaded guilty to a charge under the Highway Traffic Act, of driving a motor vehicle on a highway without first having obtained a license for the current year. On the first charge he was fined \$10, on costs, or in default of payment one month in jail. On the second charge he was fined \$10, on costs, and the sentence in case of default in first case to cover the second case.

Two residents of Point Pleasant, charged jointly under the Excise Act with having stills in their possession, were sentenced. One was fined \$100 and costs of \$8.30 or three months in jail. The other, a second offender, was sentenced to six months in jail without the option of a fine, and in addition a fine of \$500 and costs of \$2.30, or in default of payment of the fine and costs an additional six months in jail. The case had been up previously and had been adjourned for judgment.

Sinatra Separated From His Wife

29 — (AP) — Frankie Sinatra, one-time hero of squealing bobby-soxers, was legally separated yesterday from his wife of 11 years and a healthy chunk of his huge income.

Mrs. Nancy Sinatra, 30, the boyhood sweetheart of the crooner, won a separate maintenance decree by default in Superior Court. She also was awarded custody of their three children.

The Sinatras have been separated since last Feb. 1. At that time the 33-year-old Sinatra set gossip tongues wagging with an international pursuit of actress Ava Gardner. Sinatra was not in court today. He and Miss Gardner attended the Louis-Charles heavy weight fight in New York Wednesday night.

Under the settlement, Mrs. Sinatra will receive:

One-third of his gross income up to \$150,000 annually. After that, her share drops to approximately 10 per cent on a scale based on income tax tables.
