In a superficial sense, your husband's involvement with the widow appears to be a by-product of your recent physical incapacitation, precipitated by major surgery. But basically his folly in flitting from track in a period of crisis in your life, is simply an aspect of his own frustration.

At 60, with his virility waning (even the affair finds him wanting in competition), a kind of ailment that surgery can't correct. He is a problem for the whole family, and it might seem uncharitable to leave him only because of that. My advice is, take your time.

Make very best use of your convenience and health to become a growing person in your own right, a healthy, vital, dynamic, outgoing and helpful interested in group activities, and eventually, in the general welfare of your potentials permit. That's the antidote to your present dilemma.
