CONTRACT BRIDGE

QUIZ
You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:
East South West North
1 ♠ Dbl. Pass 2 ♠
Pass?
What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?
1. ♠AK92 ♣82 ♣Q83 ♠AQ74
2. ♠KJ76 ♣8 ♠AQ85 ♠KQ32
3. ♠AK8 ♣KJ4 ♠KQJ93 ♠Q7
4. ♠AK982 ♣6 ♠KJ7 ♠AQ85
1. Pass. The takeout double represents an opening bid or better. Once the double is made there is no obligation to continue bidding unless partner responds strongly or unless there are values clearly in excess of a minimum double. It must be remembered that when partner responds to the double in minimum terms, he may have a poor hand.
2. Three clubs. Here there are also 15 high card points, but the singleton heart raises the value of the hand sufficiently to justify a further bid. The three club bid invites partner to go on if he has the values that can produce a game opposite an informative double with extra values. No thought should be given to showing the spades or diamonds.
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Chignecto Canal Job Is Plugged By Irving

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—New Brunswick industrialist K. C. Irving told the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade annual that federal government tariff policies had done the people of the Atlantic area out of enough money in the last 70 years "to construct the Chignecto Canal once every six months."
It was the usually taciturn Irving's first public speech. The canal would cut across the narrow Isthmus of Chignecto between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia linking the Bay of Fundy and Northumberland Strait.
Mr. Irving told delegates attending the board's closing dinner that the cost of the canal was estimated in 1873 as slightly more than \$5,000,000. It now was estimated by the federal government at between \$90,000,000 and \$140,000,000.
He said the report of the Nova Scotia Jones Commission of 1934 showed why the Maritimes are "number one" on the national charity list, and contended that Canada's tariff policy had cost the Maritimes roughly 5 per cent more than the benefits received through confederation.
NET TARIFF COST
In dollars and cents the net tariff cost to the Atlantic provinces in 1931—one of the depression years—was \$10,817,000. Using \$10,000,000 as a per annum round figure, the net cost for a 50-year period would be \$2,090,000,000. For a 70-year period it would work out to \$5,885,000,000. Mr. Irving said he himself had compared the figures.
"The interest alone would build the Chignecto Canal every six months."
He urged the federal government to take immediate steps to provide whatever assistance possible to build the canal immediately "regardless of cost" and so "restore our faith in Confederation."
"The Chignecto had been a promise of Confederation and had been promised several times since."
He noted that federal Transport Minister Hees had said that the studies for construction of the canal were still in progress.
FOUR - POINT PROGRAM
He outlined a four point program for aid to the Maritime economy:
1. Construction of the Chignecto Canal.
2. Elimination of the premium on the Canadian dollar.
3. A reduction in interest rates.
4. Reduced credit restrictions.
As an initial step, he urged a full-scale investigation and engineering study including by draulic model test of the proposed 16 1/2 mile waterway.
He said the CNR "through their short sighted policy" had contributed to the destruction of coastal shipping and industry.
"The CNR would be enjoying more satisfactory operation if we had an industrialized and populated Maritimes, and their popularity was in keeping with that of the rest of Canada."
BILL APPROVED
OTTAWA (CP)—The Senate Banking committee Thursday approved a Commons bill raising the number of Superior and Supreme Court judges in Quebec, British Columbia and Alberta. The bill raises to 51 from 48 the number of Superior Court judges in Quebec, to 13 from 11 the number of Supreme Court judges in British Columbia and to eight from six in the trial judges of the Alberta Supreme Court. The bill now returns to the Senate for final approval.
