



**SHOUTS AT KHRUSHCHEV STIFLED**

**Canada-U.K. Trade Problem Brought to Public Attention**

By JOHN BELANGER Canadian Press Staff Writer That age-old problem of the trading imbalance between Canada and the United Kingdom raised its ugly head again last week.

However, in comparison with British export performance in other markets, and notably the U.S.A., much still remains to be done in Canada."

D. F. Kershaw, president of the British Canadian Trade Association told that body's 12th annual meeting at Montebello, Que., that Canada's anti-dumping laws "very definitely act as a deterrent to the development of British sales in this market."

In 1963, Canada exported to the United Kingdom a total of \$1,006,838,006 in goods compared with \$300,640,888 exported last year.

He added that "it is apparent that some definite improvement is now taking place."

And the figures for the first three months of this year show little improvement in the U.S.A. position. For the three months ended March 31, Canada exported \$266,058,220 to Britain compared with exports during the same period of 1963 of \$208,321,714.

**Steel Magazine Predicts Record For 1964 Sales**

CLEVELAND (AP) — Sales this year by the metal working industry will reach a record \$200,000,000, Steel predicts. The estimate is based on Steel's semi-annual survey of 5,000 plant managers.

Here are some of their predictions for the second half of the year:

—Sales will top those of the same period last year by 5.7 per cent. (They look for this year's total to beat last year's record \$182,000,000,000 by 5.5 per cent.)

—Unit manufacturing costs (labor, materials, overhead) will rise 1.9 per cent above the first-half total.

—Profits will climb 2.7 per cent above the first half's and 4.9 per cent above the comparable 1963 figure.

—Employment will jump 2.1 per cent above the first half figure.

—Advancing technologies and accompanying skill requirements are reaching problem proportions for metalworking managers, "the magazine says.

"Thirty-seven per cent anticipate immediate openings for skilled employees."

Meanwhile, Steel adds, this summer will be one of the best in the steel industry's history with strong demands for construction products cushioning the impact of automotive model-changovers and plant vacations during July and August.

Marketing men estimate that steel consumption during the third quarter will total about 20,250,000 tons, 750,000 tons higher than that of the corresponding period of 1963, Steel said.

Third-quarter shipments are expected to be about 19,500,000 tons.

100,000 BEES STOLEN BOGNOR REGIS, England (Reuters)—Police are investigating the theft of 100,000 bees from an estate near this south England seaside resort. It was reported Monday.

The bees were stolen from the estate of the Duke of Norfolk, the lord lieutenant of Sussex.

**UC Paper Critical Of RC Games**

TORONTO (CP)—The United Church Observer says Roman Catholic parishes flout the law and encourage laxness in law enforcement by raising church funds by gambling.

An editorial in the July issue of the church publication says: "There is irrefutable evidence that it is gambling that feeds the criminal elements of North America. We don't need more gambling, we need less. And the law enforcement people and all decent citizens need the cooperation of the Roman Catholic Church to stamp it out."

The editorial concedes there are greater sins than bingo-playing and calls for Catholic criticism of Protestant faults. It also praises the Roman Catholic record on the moral issues of race and color discrimination.

"But in this area of gambling," the Observer says, "whether the evangelical churches of America are wrong, or the Catholics are wrong. Gambling has become one of the greatest social evils of the continent."

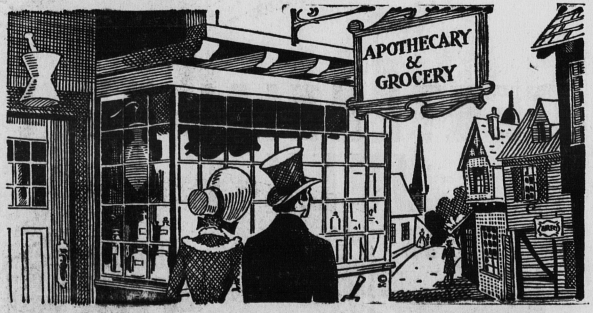
