The Bishop of Charlottetown.

News that Bishop McIntyre has passed away from earth was received here this morning.

His Lordship left Charlottetown yesterday morning in the steamship Stanley.

This is the short and simple story of an event which will be mourned throughout the diocese of the good Bishop—by Protestants as well as Catholics.

Nothing to wall Or knock the breast, no weakness, no contempt Dispraise or blame, nothing but well and fair.

It is true too, that Bishop McIntyre had completed the allotted span of human life and that recent ailments and illnesses had caused his friends to anticipate the time when he should depart and be no more seen.

The good Bishop was born at Cable Head on the 29th June, 1818, so that he had almost completed his seventy-third year.

We note, in looking over the Dominion Statutes, that this Province is not liberally dealt with, either in respect to the number of its Judges or the remuneration obtained by them for their services.

Of Bishop McIntyre's administration it is almost needless to say anything. Many of his good works are seen and known of all men.

The wisdom of his course is justified by the growth of the Roman Catholic Church in this diocese.

In 1877 he organized the Central Council of the Catholic Total Abstinence Mission with affiliated societies in every part of the diocese.

The Charlottetown Hospital was established by him in 1878.

As a man and a prelate, he was a grand and admirable figure.
