## 1st French Atomic Explosion Is Expected Before Year End

PARIS (Reuters) — France is moving swiftly toward the first explosion of its wholly French-made atomic bomb—perhaps before the end of the year.

Official sources decline comment on when it will occur.

They refer to a statement three weeks ago by army minister Pierre Guillaumat, who then reaffirmed France's determination to become an atomic power.

Asked when the first explosion will occur, he replied merely: "Not this summer."

Meanwhile, newspapers have been saying France already has a small stock of untested A-bombs and that, starting next year, France will be able to supply itself and the French community of nations with up to three A-bombs a year.

Two French reactors at Marcoule already are producing plutonium and a third will go into full production soon.

French atomic experts say their government will go into production of a French H-bomb—unless agreement is reached with the United States on sharing atomic secrets.

ALL MEMBERS SHARE  
An agreement was reached in Madagascar last week by which all member states of the French community will share ownership of French atom bombs.

Two conclusions were drawn from this:

1. An explosion is near.
2. French president de Gaulle and the government are determined not to allow any pressure from the United States or Britain to result in French abandonment of nuclear tests before its own are carried out.

HALEFAX (CP)—The weather office says there will be little

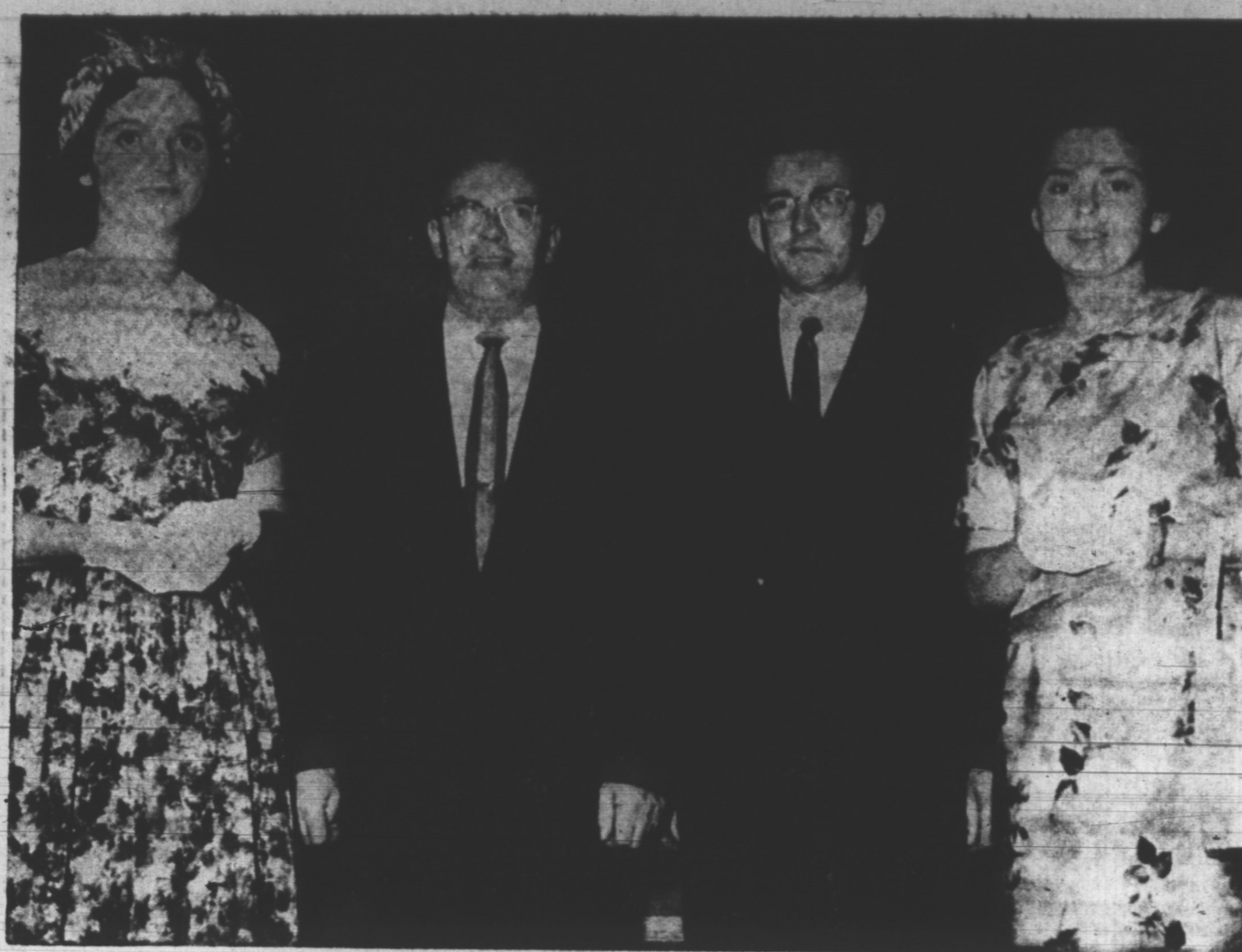
change in the weather picture for the next 24 hours. Fog will be confined to windward coasts.
