Veteran Murray River Doctor And Wife Honored

Dr. Lester Brehaut was honored by a public reception at the Murray River hall last evening on the occasion of his 50th anniversary as a member of the medical profession. Honored also was Mrs. Brehaut, who faithfully served beside her husband during those years in which he tended his patients throughout the district. The hall was filled to overflowing, and the large number who were unable to get into the building listened to the proceedings by means of a sound system. Men, women and children, too, had come from every part of the district to give a deserving tribute to a family doctor who had served them so well and so faithfully for fifty years.

A brief entertaining program was presented at the beginning of the evening, with Mr. Kwiat Keeping very capably presiding as chairman. At the close of the program a fitting address was read by Mr. Malcolm A. MacNeill in which he recalled the many hardships which Dr. Brehaut had undergone during his medical practice. Gifts were then offered, not for their intrinsic value, but as a token of the love and gratitude felt by the people of the district for Dr. and Mrs. Brehaut.

Little Miss Reta May Ferguson, prettily gowned, graciously presented Mrs. Brehaut with a beautiful bouquet of flowers, after which the other gifts were brought in, a lazy-boy chair, easy rocker chair, silver tea set, tri-light, smokers stand, coffee table, Tappan electric wrist watch, power lawn mower, gladstone travelling bag, pop-up toaster, cigars, bed room slippers, and at the conclusion Dr. Brehaut was presented with a sum of money, all given as a material expression of the love and appreciation felt for the honored guests for their years of faithful service to the community.

Dr. Brehaut, on behalf of himself and Mrs. Brehaut, fittingly expressed his thanks for the generous and magnificent gifts tendered them. Premier A.W. Matheson expressed his good wishes to the honored couple, and wished for them many more years to enjoy the fruits of their labours.

Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, Charlottetown, recounted many of his former associations with Dr. Brehaut, congratulating the doctor on his attainment of 50 years in medical practice, and commending Mrs. Brehaut for her assistance during those years. He also commended Mrs. Edith MacDonald, nurse, who assisted Dr. Brehaut with many of his cases. Dr. MacMillan concluded by announcing that a resolution had been passed by the P.E.I. Medical Association extending good wishes to Dr. and Mrs. Brehaut.

Also speaking were Dr. Preston MacIntyre, Dr. M.L. Bonnell, and Mrs. Edith MacDonald, who extended best wishes to Dr. and Mrs. Brehaut. Present at the function was Mr. Thomas R. Jackson, now of Lower Montague, who was the first child brought into this world by Dr. Brehaut on May 15th, 1903, the day following his taking up residence in the district. It is also a matter of note that Dr. Brehaut also brought into the world Mr. Jackson's two children, Colin and Roger. Mr. Jackson was born at Point Pleasant, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas D. Jackson.

Teachers' Conventions At Souris And Mount Stewart

Mrs. Annie MacPhee, Armadale, was named president for the coming year as the Eastern Kings School Teachers concluded their two-day convention at Souris yesterday.

Mr. Daniel MacDonald, St. Peters, was named vice president, and Miss Phyllis Morrison, St. Peters, was elected secretary. Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education, gave the chief address of the second day's activities. He spoke on the teaching of silent reading, stating that the fundamental object of reading is to obtain the thought contained in the written work. It was noteworthy, he said, that children failed to write correct answers only because they were unable to interpret the question asked, and he was of the opinion that silent reading was a primary means whereby a student would acquire the skill to read ideas, and interpret them while reading.

Through a demonstration Dr. Shaw clearly showed that the fast reader was able to retain as many ideas as the slow reader, and by that manner was able to cover, in some cases, twice as much reading as the slower reader. He said, was more given to word reading, while the fast reader pictured the ideas. Although oral reading had a place in the classroom work, he hesitated to over-emphasize it, since a child might be led to word read, rather than idea read. Miss Helen Yeo of the staff of Prince of Wales College, spoke on the course of studies relating to English. She stated that the changes in texts were in keeping with the growing knowledge on child education, which gave encouragement and guidance in the learning processes.

In attempting to prepare the child as a future citizen, educators must not overlook the above at today. Miss Yeo also dwelt to some considerable extent on spelling, and the development of a spelling conscience in the child. It was necessary, she said, to relate spelling to phonics and syllabication, and the use of the dictionary.

Home and School Mr. Melvin J. MacQuaid, Souris, gave an interesting talk on the Home and School Association, stating that its purpose was to bring together the parents and teachers to solve problems of common interest. The association, he said, did not interfere with the organization of the school, but merely suggested some improvements which might assist in helping and guiding the child.

Mr. J. G. Dennis and Mr. Richard Hennessy presented an instructive talk on credit unions.

and urged the formation of a teachers credit union through the medium of the Teachers Federation.

Miss Estelle Bowness gave an instructive report on her work with the Junior Red Cross. A question box was conducted with Dr. Shaw answering many questions pertaining to the department and to certain subjects. Included in the resolutions were thanks extended to Rev. Mother Superior for the use of the Souris Convent hall, to Dr. Shaw, H. J. Hynes, Kenneth Parker, Mrs. Sadie Coffin and J. A. S. Williams.

It was also resolved that henceforth the first day of the convention be dedicated to lectures by guest speakers, while the work of the second day consist principally of demonstrations by local teachers.

Resolved that the fall vacation be abolished, and all schools reopen the first week of September. Resolved that the convention favored the establishing of a teachers aid fund. Resolved that the Thorndike dictionaries be subsidized and become authorized texts in the junior grades.

Resolved that Latin be re-instated on the grade ten curriculum as a compulsory subject with a minimum assignment of the first twenty-three lessons of Hamilton and Carlyle text. Resolved that the convention favored the forming of a teachers credit union through the medium of the P.E.I. Teachers Federation.

At Mount Stewart At the Mt. Stewart teachers' convention a program exactly similar to that outlined above at Souris was conducted with the same speakers. Those appearing in Mt. Stewart in the morning spoke at Souris in the afternoon.

Mr. Warren McGuirk was elected president with Mr. George Hendricken as vice president and Miss Mable O'Brien as secretary. Dr. L. W. Shaw addressed the group early in the morning session as he gave a demonstration of silent reading for comprehension. Mr. Richard Hennessy told the advantages of credit unions for the teachers and Miss Marie Bowness told the assembled teachers of the many ways in which Junior Red Cross could be of great help to crippled children.

Miss Helen Yeo, of the staff at Prince of Wales College, gave a brief address and a demonstration on the subject of language teaching. Yesterday's meeting, which con-

cluded the convention, was a continuance of that of Tuesday, Mr. J. P. McCarthy, principal of Truro Normal School, who was scheduled to speak on "What is Teaching" was unable to be present at the two meetings yesterday. Further meetings in the series of teachers conventions are scheduled for today at O'Leary and Tignish. They will also be carried on tomorrow.
