**Canadian Bazaar.**

TORONTO, Nov 26.—The Telegram's special cable from London says: "The Marchioness of Lansdowne, wife of the secretary of state for war and former governor general of Canada, will open the Canadian bazaar which will be held at the residence of Lord Brassey on the 30th instant. The object of the bazaar is to aid the clergy endowment fund in the diocese of Quappelle, Northwest Territories."

**PORK PACKING.**—The Nova Scotia company will build an ice house at once and a factory with a capacity of 25,000 lbs. The company will increase its capital to \$50,000.

**SHEEP AND CATTLE.**—There were 150 sheep and 16 fat cattle shipped from Summerside on Saturday by the Northumberland. Mr. David Keefe was the shipper. The shipment was for St John.

**SHEEP KILLED.**—Dogs killed upwards of twenty sheep for Akron Dow, Harris Akerly and Woodford Wright, of Southampton, N B, last week. They came from Kilmarnock, a distance of seven miles through the woods and were tracked to their homes and one of them shot.

**A BIG STRIKE.**—Three thousand cotton mill hands walked out on strike at Augusta, Ga, one day last week, six mills in all having to be closed down. The announcement of a cot in wages made necessary by close competition was the cause.

**WILL BE A HOTEL MAN.**—W A Jordan of North End leaves tomorrow for Montague, P. E. Island. By the death of his sister recently Mr. Jordan came into considerable property in Montague, including the Hillcrest hotel. Mr. Jordan will run the house himself in future and leaves tomorrow to enter upon his new sphere of labor.—St. John Gazette.

**THE NEW ZEALAND WAY.**—Drunkenness having made alarming strides in New Zealand, it has been resolved to call in the aid of photography to put it down. In future, any one who may be condemned on the charge of being drunk and disorderly will have to have his photograph taken at his own expense, and distribute it among all innkeepers, taverners, etc. The idea is that publicans will then be able to refuse to serve anyone whose portrait appears in the original gallery.

**FRIGHTENED TO DEATH.**—Miss Lettie Hall, the 18 year old daughter of a farmer, recently visited a fortune teller in the hamlet of West Butler, N. Y., and was told by the seeress, it is said, that she (Miss Hall) would die within three days. The girl died suddenly the third day after her visit to the fortune teller, and it is supposed that, inasmuch as the young woman was in perfect health at the time of her interview with the medium, she died from paralysis of the brain, superinduced by fright.

**LAST SHIPMENT.**—According to the Guardian's correspondent Mr S H Jones made his last shipment of 300 lambs from Summerside on Saturday, making a total of 11,035 sheep and lambs since Oct 13th. He made his last shipment of geese which completed a total of 6,000 geese. He has during this season paid to farmers for stock, about \$30,000, about \$700 to the P. E. I. R. R., and nearly \$1900.00 to the Steam Navigation Co. This is the largest season's business done by Mr Jones on the Island since he first came here.

**LOTS OF HENS.**—It is pointed out by an exchange that Edward Waterman, of Waldboro, Maine, has 344 hens, of which 275 are pullets. He has 25 coops, covered with glass—in all 2,200 square feet of hen houses. The hens are mostly of the best breeds. He raised this year 30 barrels of apples, 2 tons of cabbage and 59 bushels of turnips, from one and one-half acres of land, and feeds these products to the hens. A few years ago he could sell what he raised on his land for \$175, now he could not get \$20 for it. But he makes some money on his hens.

**SOCIAL LIFE OF CLERKS.**—Some people say that the private character of an employee should have no bearing upon his relations with his employer; that so long as he does his work satisfactorily it is nobody's business how he spends his time away from the store. This is a fallacious idea, however. In railroads, banks, and other lines of business there is a strict watch kept upon the habits of employees, and if they are known to be spending their spare hours in dissipation, it is not long before they are dropped from their positions. Employers know that it is only a question of time when last living means stealing.—The Keystone.

**SEIZED FOR DEBT.**—According to a recent despatch from Bridgewater, Conn., the \$10,000 church chimes, which were presented to the Holy Ghost Greek Orthodox Church of that city by the Czar of Russia shortly after his coronation, have been attached for \$3,000 by Charles H. Hawley, to recover on a note of \$2,050. The six bells are said to be the handsomest of their kind in the United States, having been cast under the direction of the Imperial court of Russia. They are highly ornamented with inscriptions and figures. The Czar's gift has proved a white elephant to the church. The society is now trying to raise the necessary funds to lift the attachment on the bells.
