NOTES AND COMMENTS.

"I think," said Sir Thomas McMillan recently, "that the fast steamship service between Canada and Australia will have the effect of enlivening all other lines connected with either country. The Canadian-Australian cable is a project that eventually will be consummated. The mercantile route between England and Australia will be exclusively across Canada and the Pacific Ocean. The Pacific is a better route than the Indian Ocean or the Red Sea, and again, all the ports touched at are British, which makes a great difference."

"We think that our correspondent, 'An Indignant Citizen,' takes an odd view of the case. It is not as if the Messrs. Crabbe and Beer, Horne and McKay found that temperance electors were going to vote against them because the party whip had been cracked, and gripped the diabolical were in the field, they were surprised and indignant. If they had waited twenty-four hours sooner, no one could have said that they did wrong in backing out of the contest and thus preventing against the raising of a political party crisis in civic elections. Citizens would, in that case, have had some time to consider whether or not other candidates should be brought forward. The event ought to be the effect of awakening electors from the apathy into which they have fallen in respect to civic matters. If ratpayers were alive to their interests, liberties would not be taken with their rights."

Mr. S. H. Blake, of Toronto, was very hard the other day on the newspaper press the evidence in the murder case. During the progress of the recent Boston murder trial the Boston papers were day after day filled with details of the evidence. Many timid people were alarmed about the possible consequences of so much publicity, and one mother resolved that her children should not be allowed upon any account to see the newspapers. The sequel is recorded in the attention of Mr. Blake. Coming into the nursery one day, this lady, whose intentions were excellent, found her children singing the following chorus, which they had heard on the streets or from the servants: Lizzie Borden got an axe And gave her mother twenty whacks And when she found what she had done She gave her father twenty-one. Before the father of the newspaper press the evidence in the murder case was gossiped from mouth to mouth, and the statistics do not show that this means of communicating news was conducive to the morality of the people.

Mr. Wilkie, lately President of the Toronto Board of Trade, delivered an address to the Board upon the occasion of his retirement, in the course of which he said: "Canada is ready for reciprocity on a fair, if not upon a wide basis, but the movement has been delayed by the retention of political parties in Canada, and by the writings of a few irresponsible outsiders, some of them actuated by personal, some by selfish motives, who have led United States statesmen to hold on to their basis of reciprocity which could not end otherwise than in political union. Canada will never consent to barter her national and political individuality for any commercial consideration." Here, as the Montreal Star remarks, the country is with him. "British connection is the only connection for Canada." We want to buy and sell with our neighbors, but we do not want to give up our commercial heritage for our good behavior. Such protection as we need we intend to keep, and our independence we shall preserve absolutely. Outside of the self-protection lines, we are ready to meet favor with favor, low tariff with low tariff, and Congress may be sure of this in dealing with the Wilson schedules.

How Two Americans Are Alleged to Have Made Their Escape. F. C. Selous, the explorer, who recently returned to London from South Africa, where he has been distinguished himself in the operations against the Matabele, tells a graphic story of his experience with the Wilson detachment, recently massacred by the Matabele. Selous is a hunter, of the prominent and brilliant rank taken by two Americans, Ingram and Barnham, during Captain Wilson's pursuit of King Lobengula. The natives, saying they were keeping a hot fire from both sides of the valley, and the white men were it steadily. Wilson called to Barnham and asked if he thought he could ride back to the main column, commanded by Major Selous, to their help. To this Barnham replied, "I will try, major but I would like Fred Ingram to accompany me." Capt. Wilson agreed to this, and after leading the Matabele the American rode out of the valley in the right hand and made for the king's wagon track, which they were just approaching when they were overtaken by the Matabele, who opened fire upon them. But the Americans outflanked them and managed to get clear. No sooner were they clear of their pursuers, however, than they came upon a second and much larger force, rapidly advancing through the brush and evidently bent upon joining in the attack upon the Wilson party. But when they saw the Matabele they turned back and fled. The Americans charged upon them, thinking they would be able to surround them, but Barnham and Ingram rode splendidly and firm, with such good effect that they again succeeded in spite of the fact that their horses were tired, outflanking the Matabele. When the Americans were finally clear, their brilliant display of generalship, horsemanship and manly courage, they and their horses were completely exhausted. When questioned as to the state in which they left the Wilson party, replying to the question of the Wilson party, who asked Ingram if the Wilson party could possibly outflank the Matabele and retreat down the Shangani river, the American replied, "I guess not, for four men have been dismounted and the horses of many of the others were completely done for. Some of those with the best horses might certainly have escaped, but they were not the class of men to let their horses be done for. No, doctor, I guess they fought it right out where they stood."
