TORNADO DOES DAMAGE.

Wrecks Churches and Other Buildings at Elizabeth, N. J.

NEW YORK, August 3.—New Jersey was visited by a tornado yesterday causing great damage to buildings and property. Several churches were blown down, two theatres and scores of dwellings were unroofed. The damage is estimated at a quarter of a million.

Reassuring Gold.

MONTREAL, August 2.—The run started yesterday on the Hochelaga bank, but that bank was prepared and promptly met all demands. When it became apparent the run was likely to continue, President St. Charles, Vice-President Bickerdike and several directors, took charge of the crowds and assisted in facilitating the payment of money; several additional paying wickets been established. Early in the day cheques were paid in paper money, but as the crowd increased, gold was carried out of the safe and piled up on the counters before the tellers, in full view of everybody. At first it was left in boxes, but officials thought the effect would be more reassuring if the gold could be seen, and they broke the seals and poured it out. The display had the desired effect and some, who had caught the contagion of the panic, left the bank without drawing their money. By noon every cheque had been paid out and the excitement diminished.

Three minutes later another rush began but it lasted only a few moments. All the afternoon withdrawals continued, but the excitement gradually subsided and by 3 o'clock bank officials breathed more easily. The run was one of the most exciting Montreal has witnessed in a number of years.

ACCIDENT TO THE COLUMBIA

Dismasted in the Race Yesterday

MAST BROME OFF HALF WAY ABOVE DECK.

Sails and Rigging Piled up in a Tangled Mess.

NEW YORK, August 3.—In the race between the Columbia and Defender yesterday the former was dismasted.

The new boat was towed up to her builders wharf a total wreck above deck.

Her steel mast was bent double, just about half way between the deck and the masthead and all that remained of her magnificent spread of canvas and specially made rigging was piled up in a heap about the stump of the mast in a tangled mass of wire shrouds, metal turnbuckles, blocks and ropes.

Venezuelan Boundary.

PARIS, Aug. 1.—At yesterday's session of the Anglo-Venezuelan boundary arbitration commission, M. Mallet-Prevost, the secretary of that body, continued his presentation of the Venezuelan case. Baron Russell of Killowen, Lord Chief Justice of England, suggested the advisability of Mr. Mallet-Prevost curtailing his argument, but Mr. Melville W. Fuller, Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court, intervened in favor of the speaker.

OBITUARY.

It is with feelings of deep emotion that we are called upon today to record the death at the early age of 27 years, of Patrick Cantwell, of Souris West. The sad event occurred at the residence of his brother, James Cantwell, of 63 Circuit St. Roxbury, Mass. About seven months ago he was stricken down with hemorrhage of the lungs, and notwithstanding the medical aid of the best physicians and the kind and careful treatment of near and dear friends, he never recovered, and passed peacefully away to his eternal rest on the 21st ult. He was attended in his illness by his sister-in-law, whose untiring but futile efforts for his recovery, elicited the heartfelt gratitude of all his friends. His remains accompanied by his brother and his brother's wife, arrived on the 25th ult at the home of their parents, Souris West. On the following day they were conveyed to St. Alexis Church, Rollo Bay, where funeral service was performed over them by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Walker, after which they were consigned to their last resting place, under the shadow of St. Alexis' cross, there to await the sound of the last trumpet.

Deceased was of a very kind and generous disposition, thereby making hosts of friends, and he bore his last illness with patience and resignation. His spiritual wants were well attended to by Rev. Father Fay, who was a daily visitor to his bedside.

He leaves a father, mother, three sisters and two brothers besides a large circle of friends and acquaintances to mourn his loss.

Confidence Restored in Financial Circles.

LAKEVILLE BRIDGE.

SIR,—Permit me through the columns of your valuable journal to say a few words to the public concerning an item that appeared in the Patriot of the 20th inst., headed "Lakeville Bridge" and signed "Farmer."

He states that the bridge built in 1878 cost \$1,800, and always entailed considerable expense each year to keep it in repair. Permit me to inform "Farmer" that the actual cost of the erection of that bridge was \$1,100 and it never incurred one dollar of expense for twenty years with the exception of planking the driveway. The men who constructed that bridge are now dead. But everybody who had the pleasure of their acquaintance, will give them the credit of being good mechanics who knew well how to put lumber together. He also claims that there has been a saving of \$1,000 effected in the construction of this bridge.

The saving of that \$1,000 corresponds favorably with the other savings that are effected by the gang of "incapables" that at present handle the affairs of Prince Edward Island.

He says that this bridge stands a credit to the Government or supervisor. Well, if that is a structure that anyone can claim credit for, credit must be easily obtained. During the months of April, May, June, and up to the 12th of July, the condition of that bridge was disgraceful to any civilized community. And the public were generous enough to remain silent through respect for the poor men, who were engaged in constructing this emblem of grit economy, until "Farmer" rushes into the columns of The Patriot, and tells us that the Government or the supervisor—he scarcely knows which which—deserves great credit for this noble structure!

Mr. Editor, there are small wooden structures throughout this district, which were formerly known as water-ways. But are now shown in the public accounts as "Large Bridges" that are in such a disgraceful state that on approaching one of the you have to brace your feet, clinch your teeth, look out for your hat; and was beside you, if you are so unfortunate as to be afflicted with anything like a sore back. The advice to the Government concerning steel bridges, is simply ridiculous, as if every bridge is not a steel. The contractors, no doubt have earned their money, and perhaps more money than they have received. But to state, that there has been a saving of \$1000 effected in the construction of this bridge, "is simply rot." One suggestion Mr. Editor and I am done. I propose that a first class artist, be employed by the Government, sent up to Lakeville and let him draw a full picture of this bridge, have 100 feet or more of the railing colored brown and marked, built under Conservative rule, and the balance colored white, from a soaking of dirty lime, and by no means let him forget the cross ties where one end of the stick is spruce and the other end fir. Have it properly framed, and sent to the Halifax exhibition—as we are not to have one of our own, and possibly, for a consideration, in the shape of a small amount of money, the Supervisor, might be induced to take it in charge and he could explain to the people of Nova Scotia the economy that is practised in the Public Works Department of P. E. Island.
