MACKEREL.—A correspondent of the Pioneer writes from Tignish: "At last, mackerel have started to bite and fishermen are rejoicing over a good week's work. A heavy body of mackerel is reported on the west side, but on the east side nothing has yet been done; weather last week was too windy for boats to go round the reef, without which no fish could be got, so that but little was done by Tignish fishermen. Seiners have done little the past two weeks. Mackerel show up for an instant, but disappear before the net can be set. The spring schooner Isak's Patch met one school of mackerel from which she sailed 200 barrels. This was the largest take up to this date. Catching is good, and if the weather continues favorable, those engaged will, no doubt, secure a fair margin. Lobster fishing is over, and all appear well satisfied with the season's work. Some factories did first rate, while all will average well."

WE were much gratified recently, in observing in more than one American newspaper, accounts of the consecration of two new churches in the diocese of Odenburg, New York, and which had been erected by the efforts of the Rev. Father James A. McKenna, formerly of this diocese, and son of John A. McKenna, Esq., on 24th June, Bishop Washburn consecrated the new church edifice, at High Market, and administered the Sacrament of Confirmation. On 6th June, His Lordship dedicated the new church at Constablene, under the invocation of St. Mary. Both buildings are described as being large, beautiful and displaying much taste, and furthermore being out of debt. The bishop supplemented the people upon their good work, and also in having such an earnest, energetic and zealous pastor as the Rev. Father McKenna, who laboring under so many and various disadvantages, had succeeded in erecting such magnificent temples of worship. The Ultra Protestants and other papers speak in the highest terms of Father McKenna, who has been stationed at Constablene for four years, and who has endeavored himself to the hearts of all classes of people, without regard to sect.—Herald.

Ship Abandoned—Terrible Calamity.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 2. Friday last, thirty miles off Catalina, Trinity Bay, the British war-ship Mallard encountered the Welsh brigantine Resolven, abandoned. The vessel was damaged on both sides. There was no sign of the crew. Later—inspection of the Resolven shows her to have collided with an iceberg. The crew and passengers, eighteen in number, must have been drowned by the swamping of the boats. One hundred and forty-five icebergs are between the scene of the disaster and Wadham Island.

Germans Recalled.

HONG KONG, Sept. 2. The German authorities are calling in German subjects in the Chinese service. Lieut. Hagenevier, instructor of torpedoes, has been ordered to resign. English employees in the Chinese fleet have resigned.

The Sale of Chinese Merchants Fleet.

LONDON, Sept. 3. The Times's Foo Chow correspondent telegraphs that the Chinese merchants fleet has been sold to Messrs. Russell. It consisted of twenty-six steamers, aggregating 23,544 tons.

A MOB of two hundred men and boys surrounded the garrison army barracks, at Paris, Ont., on the night of the 1st inst., for the purpose of robbing General Atherton. Some members of the army who ventured out were greeted with a shower of these missiles and beat a hasty retreat. The army was kept prisoner till two a. m., when it managed to escape by the rear of the building. The police were powerless. Atherton's reputed relations with a female member of the army caused the trouble.

FOR the past six days a fire in the shaft on the eastern slope of the Spring Hill mines has been in progress. No particulars have been received at the agency of the company in St. John. It is supposed that the fire was produced by embers from the stationary engine, which communicated with the coal and wood-work at the bottom of the shaft. All the water obtainable has been poured into the mine, and it was stated on Saturday that the fire was under control.—St. John Telegraph.

THE longest bridge in the world, says an exchange, is at Lagaug, over an arm of the China sea. It is five miles long and is built of stone. It has three hundred arches, seventy feet high, and a roadway seventy feet wide. It has a balustrade the pillars of which are seventy-five feet apart, each pillar supporting a lion twenty-one feet long, made of a single block of marble.
