IDA BAILEY ALLEN Duet Of Old Favorites Harmonizes With Budget

Today we present two old favorites in new ways. They are easy to do and budget wise, so-so good. Both are made with canned evaporated milk in place of fresh milk.

TOMORROW'S DINNER
Watercress Salad
Celery and Carrot Sticks
Salmon Casserole with Creamed Green Peas
Warmmed Crisp Potato Chips
Baked Custards
Butterscotch-Type Coffee Tea
Milk Measurements level; recipes for 6

SALMON CASSEROLE
1 (1 lb.) can salmon
1/2 c. celery, chopped fine
1/4 c. onion, chopped fine
2 tsp. margarine
1 egg beaten
1 c. undiluted evaporated milk
10 double soda crackers, crushed
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. salt
Drain liquid from can of salmon and reserve. Remove bones and skin. Flake salmon.

Saute celery and onion in margarine until just tender. Combine with salmon and remaining ingredients (including reserved salmon liquid). Turn into oiled 3-qt. casserole. Bake 30 min. in a mod. oven (350 degrees F.) Serve with creamed green peas.

BAKED CUSTARDS BUTTERSCOTCH-TYPE
3 eggs, slightly eaten
1 1/2 c. undiluted evaporated milk
1 c. water
1-3 c. sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1-16 tsp. salt
6 tbsp. brown sugar

Combine all ingredients except brown sugar. Mix well without beating. Divide brown sugar among 6 (5 oz.) custard cups and press lightly onto bottom of each cup. Pour custard mixture carefully over brown sugar; do not stir. Set custard cups in shallow pan; pour in very hot water to depth of 1". Bake 45 min. in mod. oven (350 degrees F.), or until pick in center near center of custard comes out clean. Cool and chill. Loosen edges with knife. Unmold into deep sauce dishes. The brown sugar melts, forming sauce with "butterscotch" taste.

THE CHEF'S RECIPE FOR WHIPPED EVAPORATED MILK (by request)

Ingredients: 1/2 c. well-chilled evaporated milk; 3 tsp. fresh lemon juice; 24 tsp. granulated sugar; Few grains salt.

To Prepare: Combine chilled evaporated milk and lemon juice in deep qt. bowl. Beat with rotary hand beater or in electric blender until thickened. Then add granulated sugar and salt and continue beating until whipped milk stands up in peaks. Use within an hour as topping to gelatin dessert, or to fold into gelatin-cream in place of whipped cream.
