

Giants Increase Lead Over Dodgers To 3 Games

NEW YORK (AP)—The National League-leading New York Giants managed only six hits Friday night but four of them were home runs which whipped Cincinnati Reds 6-1 before a crowd of 13,153.

Westrum started the four-base parade with a blast against the left field roof in the third inning. In the fifth, Westrum walked and pitcher Ruben Gomez hit his first homer of the season, high into the left field seats.

Don Mueller opened the sixth with his second home run of the year. With two out in the sixth Dave Williams drew a walk and Hank Thompson drilled a Baczewski offering far over the right field roof.

The only other New York hits were a single by Whitey Lockman with the second out in the eighth.

Gomez, in winning his ninth game, lost his shutout in the seventh inning when Jimmy Greengrass opened with a blow against the centre field bleachers and scored on an infield out.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Relief pitcher Herm Wehmeier walked home two runs and his replacement, Jim Konstanty, was clouted for a bases-loaded triple by Bill Sarni—all in the seventh inning—as St. Louis Cardinals walloped Philadelphia Phillies 12-3 Friday night.

The Cards got six runs in their big seventh to enable ace Harvey Haddix to chalk up his 15th win against seven defeats.

In the Cardinals' seventh, Red Schoendienst singled and Stan Musial doubled, sending Red to third. Wehmeier replaced started Bob Miller and issued an intentional walk to Ray Jablonski, loading the bases. Wehmeier then unintentionally walked Joe Cunningham and Rip Repulski, forcing in two runs. Konstanty took over on the mound and Sarni tripled home three more runs, then scored on Alex Grammas' sacrifice fly.

Veteran Reinsman Danny Steele Still in Race Game

Old friends and track associates in this province of Danny Steele, formerly of Summerside may sometimes wonder if the veteran reinsman, who now lives at Alliston, Mass., is still in the racing game. For their information an excerpt from the Alliston daily paper will be of interest.

Dannie Steele, now 73 years of age, is a son of the late John Steele of Summerside, one of the foremost horse trainers of his day. His son Dannie began his racing career at the age of 17 and his first venture into the game was at Shediac. In a race there at which his father was scheduled to drive, the elder Steele was unable to get to Shediac and Dannie took over the reins and drove his horse to victory. From that memorable day racing has been in Dannie's blood and for 56 years he has piloted many of the best racers in the Canadian and New England States across the wire.

About a year ago, on doctor's orders, he was forced to retire for a while but he is now back in the game again.

"I needed the rest," he said recently, "no question about that, but I feel great now and drove my first race of the season the other night."

Dannie Steele is the oldest competitive driver at the Alliston Raceway, but his years belie his sprightliness.

He has now nine head stables at the Bay State Raceway and he anticipates a busy driving schedule for the remainder of the season. Throughout his long career Steele has never been set down or punished in any way. "That's one of the things I am proud of," he states. "There has never been a black mark against me or any of the horses I have driven."

Dannie Steele likes to remember also that he has set two of the track records at the Raceway where he now drives. He set the six furlong trotting record of 1:25 2/5 with Senator Song on August 25th, 1949 and the 3:56 3/5 record for a mile and three quarters with Muriel Hanover on the previous October.
