Assault Cases, etc.

Several cases were disposed of before J. T. Mellish, Esq., J. P., on Wednesday. James McGonnell, who had been arrested last week for having assaulted John McQuaid at Kingston on the 26th of January, was brought up from jail to answer the charge. After the evidence on both sides was taken, McGonnell was fined \$1 00 and costs or ten days' imprisonment. Mr. H. C. Shaw appeared as counsel for the complainant, and Mr. W. S. Stewart for the prisoner.

James McGonnell was also charged with the more serious offence of having, at the same time and place, assaulted John Quinn, causing grievous bodily harm. It appears that during an altercation between the parties, when Quinn had McGonnell down and was beating him, McGonnell bit the little finger of Quinn's left hand in such a manner that Dr. Jenkins had to amputate the finger. Several witnesses were examined and the magistrate adjourned the case until two o'clock on Friday, the 26th inst.

The next was a Scott Act case, H. J. Callbeck, Esq., J. P., sitting with Mr. Mellish. Mrs. Amelia Morris of Alexandria, was summoned to answer for having violated the Act. Mrs. Morris, who was not present, was represented by her counsel, Mr. J. H. Good, Attorney-at-law, and Prosecutor Matthews questioned the witnesses in his own behalf. The case was dismissed.

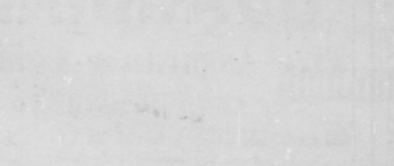
