Strange But True

Believe it or not, but gas street illumination is still used in 34 cities of the United States.

Lamp-lighters go about their duties in sections of Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, Baltimore, and Kansas City, Mo., Ohio, and Provincetown, R.I.

Gas lamps replaced kerosene lamps, lineal descendants of the whale oil burners, whose flickering, smoky flames were common 150 years ago.

Thanks to the rapid advances made in medical science, pneumonia and influenza, which together still cause more deaths at ages of one to 14 than any other disease, have declined in mortality to only one-sixth of the rate prevailing 35 years ago.

In Venezuela love letters can be mailed at half rates provided they are enclosed in rose-colored envelopes.

Thousands of Canadians stay home on voting day because they think their one vote won't make much difference. But history reminds us that several important elections were carried by a single vote.

In 1840 Marcus Morton defeated Edward Everett for governor of Massachusetts by his own vote. A single ballot cast in the state election in Rhode Island in 1811 led to the Declaration of War against England the following year.

The importance of a single vote was shown recently when the Alaskan Statehood bill was defeated in the U. S. Senate, 45 to 44.

Free Fishing Privileges At Kelly's Hatchery Pond

"God give me grace to catch a fish So big that even I, When telling of it afterwards May never need to lie."

This "Angler's Prayer" may be answered for many a fisherman in the next few days. Kelly's Hatchery Pond is open for all enthusiastic anglers with license from July 14th to July 18th, inclusive.

The Hatchery is a biological station for the Federal Fisheries Research Board, Mr. R. M. Spense, who is the Senior Research Assistant, said that the free fishing privileges for the five days are made in an effort to clear the pond of trout before it is restocked in September. Any kind or size of fish can be put in the fishing basket and taken home, after it has been weighed, measured and perhaps the stomach removed for research purposes.

During the past seven years the Federal Government Fisheries Board has been supporting a project to determine the growth rate and survival of trout living under varying conditions as exist in their ponds at Cavendish, Rustico, New Glasgow and Kelly's Hatchery Pond. The actual analysis are done at Kelly's Hatchery Pond and the Biological Station at St. Andrew's.

dyed by vegetable dye plants. The early Britains dyed their bodies with the dye of trees. Caesar in describing these people says that "All Britons stain themselves with wood which grows wild and produces a blue color which gives them a terrible appearance in battle."

The Saxon green of the Middle Ages was cloth dyed blue with woad, and afterwards yellow with weld, a wild plant. The plant has a disgusting odor and for this reason, Queen Elizabeth forbade its being sawed within 5 miles of the Royal residence.

The town of Saffron Walden in Essex, is so named because of the cultivation of the plant in the district.

Henry II, of England, ordered red coats to be worn by all engaged in fox hunting, as the king had made it a royal sport, enjoying those who took up the chase to wear royal togs. It was he, too who ordered all army uniforms to be dyed red.

The tannin-leaving leaves of the sumac tree are used to tan the finest leather for gloves.

Many plants had been used for centuries for dyeing but most of them are no longer used owing to the popularity of chemical dyes. Growing in the water of the Nile River is the famous papyrus plant from which the earliest paper was made.

Canada with over 1,000,000 square miles of forest, ranks 3rd in the world as a producer of wood, and much of this goes to the making of paper. But the best grade of paper does not come from wood. It comes from rags, and from the north African Esparto grass or rather its leaves which are extremely tough and wiry.

In Buckinghamshire, England, may be seen a barn that boasts a

New Brunswick. Mr. Spense stated that a corresponding project has been undertaken to study the different organisms eaten by the fish to determine which organisms the fish best flourish upon with regard to their rate of growth, size and survival. This is the only project known of its kind being undertaken in Canada.

Kelly's Hatchery Pond is situated approximately two and a half miles from the city, and would remind many a fisherman of the old fishin' hole where he fished with bamboo pole and worm as a boy. The pond lies in the hollow of two gently sloping hills, and is about one-eighth of a mile long surrounded by spruce and maple trees stretching over the green waters, giving shade and a cool breeze to the angler in his rowboat. One can fish from the low banks of the pond but the best fishing grounds are in the deep waters.

One day alone three hundred and five speckled trout were caught, their weight varying from a quarter to half a pound and measuring from nine to ten inches in length.

A tip to the angler who might make a trip to the Hatchery—the trout prefer worms to flies.
