## Syrian Premier Warns May Wage War On Israel

DAMASCUS, Syria (Reuters)—Syrian Premier Said Ghazzi warned Britain, the United States and France Wednesday that in face of "repeated Israeli aggression on the various armistice fronts, Syria no longer regards itself bound by international obligations. The warning was conveyed when Ghazzi received the diplomatic representatives of the three powers which in 1950 guaranteed the status quo in the Palestine area. He told them Syria, Egypt and Saudi Arabia now are bound to each other under defensive military pacts. The three Arab states would jointly retaliate with force against any "further Israeli aggression," according to the pacts' provisions, he said.

## West Rejects Red Plan To Unite Germany

GENEVA (AP)—The Western powers rejected Wednesday night Communist terms for gradual merger of the two rival German republics. British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan called Russia's German unification plan "an unparalleled dictat (dictate)."

PARIS, (Reuters)—Premier Edgar Faure Wednesday night won his vote of confidence on a measure to hold new elections next month as the Communists swung their support behind him, eager for a chance to bolster their strength in the National Assembly.

The physics award went jointly to Dr. W. E. Lamb of Stanford University and Dr. P. Kusch of Columbia University. The physicists will split prize money of \$36,720 for their work in correcting an error made by a Briton who previously won the Nobel prize. Their work was in connection with atomic measurements.

NORTH BAY, Ont. (CP)—The body of 21-year-old Grace Beaudry, missing from her home since Oct. 17, was found Wednesday near Englehart, 70 miles north of Timagami, police announced. Further details were not immediately available, police said. The girl disappeared after a plane at Timagami, Albert LaJonde, 21, is being held on a public mischief charge in connection with the Indian girl's disappearance.

## Burned Mother Touches Off Fire Investigation

BANCROFT (CP)—Words mumbled from the seared lips of a mother on a hospital operating table have sparked a police investigation into a fire Saturday which has so far taken two lives. Mary Crawford, 14, badly burned when she stayed in her flaming home here to drop other members of the family to safety from a second-storey window died in hospital at Toronto Wednesday. Her eight-year-old brother Samuel died in his bed during the fire.
