GREAT excitement prevails in Vermont over the report of the insolvency of the First National Bank of Brattleboro, one of the largest and oldest institutions in the country, representing \$500,000 capital stock with between \$50,000 and \$60,000 surplus. A suit for \$200,000 damages has been brought in the name of the bank against President Silas M. Waite, who left town on Thursday last, and of whose whereabouts the directors profess to have no knowledge. It is feared the deficiency will reach upwards of \$100,000.
