MONCTON.

Election of Mayor and Town Councillors.

Stevens, of the "Times," Re-elected Mayor.

By the Best Men of Both Parties.

MONCTON, March 10.

The annual election of Mayor and Councillors for Moncton took place yesterday. H. T. Stevens was elected Mayor over W. J. Robinson by a majority of twenty.

The contest was very keen and there was much excitement, but everything passed off quietly. The following were the Councillors elected: James H. Dunlap, Wm. Givan, Ward 1; G. B. Lutz, J. Forster, Ward 2; W. Schwartz, G. R. Sangster, Ward 3.

Mr. Stevens is editor of the Daily Times, and has filled the office for the past two years with much credit to himself, and profit to the town. In the present contest he was supported by the best men of both parties. His opponent twice before aspired to the office, but a majority of the electors on each occasion elected him to a back seat. Of course, as might have been expected, some disreputable tactics were resorted to by the Transcript, and the Grits, of the basest sort to defeat the popular candidate for the mayoralty, but these were discovered and exposed in time.

The respectable element in the community are well pleased at the choice made.

Censure of Senator Alexander.

OTTAWA, March 9.

The Senate have decided to take action against Senator Alexander, whose conduct in the Senate ever since the session opened, has been more like a madman than one of the law-makers of the country. Sir David MacPherson and Senator Allen have been grossly libelled by Senator Alexander, who charges them with almost every crime in the calendar, although politically he is an ally of the gentlemen.

In view of his conduct in the Senate, on Friday, Sir Alexander Campbell has given notice that to-day he will move the following resolution: That the Hon. Geo. Alexander, a member of this House, on Friday the 6th inst., after being called to order by the Speaker, at the instance of the House, having refused to assume in accordance with the twenty-fifth rule of the House, his seat, and having persisted in offensive language, and in disorderly conduct, is deserving of the censure of this House.

French Losses.

PARIS, March 9.

Gen. De Flisle, commander of the French forces in Tonquin, telegraphs the war office that his loss during the two days' fighting to relieve a beleaguered French garrison was 66 killed and 133 wounded. The garrison itself lost 50 killed and 33 wounded during seven assaults. Thirty French officers were killed.

A Good Feeling in India.

CALCUTTA, March 9.

The Afghan frontier question has been the subject of much discussion and anxiety here; but all classes are satisfied with the determined attitude of England, and the display of loyalty throughout the country.

A Warning.

SUARIM, March 9.

Oman Digma has sent a letter to the British General in command of the place recounting Arab successes, announcing that the fall of Kassaia is imminent, and warning the English that they will be defeated.

The Afghan Question.

LONDON, March 9.

The Times this morning states that England is all ready for a war with Russia at any time; but it is pleased to announce that the prospects look to an amicable adjustment of disputed points.

Wolsley Reviews the Troops.

KORTI, March 9.

Gen. Wolsley to-day made a general review of the Nile expeditionary force, and found them in very good condition.

Parliamentary Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 9.

In the House of Commons to-day a large number of petitions were presented. Nothing of very general interest transpired.

Italian Men-of-War.

LONDON, March 9.

The Italian men-of-war Dandolo and Conte Cavour, with six Italian torpedo vessels have arrived at Port Said.

Buller's Rear Guard.

KORTI, March 9.

The rear guard of Gen. Sir Redvers Buller's troops has arrived from Gakdul in a terribly fagged condition.

The Egyptian Army.

The Marquis of Hartington said to-day the Egyptian army would be increased by 15,000 men.

Chinese on the Defensive.

HONG KONG, March 9.

The Chinese Government is preparing to resume defensive operations in Tonquin.
