The "Northern Light" left Georgetown for Pictou this morning.

The mails arrived at Cape Traverse at one o'clock this afternoon, and left immediately for this city.

The thermometer has ranged between 20 and 30 below zero at Ottawa every night during the past week.

Hon. ARAM CHURCH, the Ontario Minister of Education, is so ill that very little hope of his recovery is entertained.

Prince Napoleon's Manifesto—French Sensations.

PARIS, Jan. 17. Prince Napoleon has issued a manifesto attacking the Republic of France. The Figaro has been seized by the Government authorities and its publication for the time being is suspended. Prince Napoleon was arrested this afternoon. The Chambers this afternoon voted on an urgency Bill, which enacts that all members of former dynasties shall be banished from France.

Attempted Assassination of the Sultan.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 17. An attempt was made on Sunday to assassinate the Sultan. Several of the assassins were killed by the Sultan's Guards, and others were dangerously wounded. The most intense excitement prevails in the city.

A Plot to Kill the Lord Lieutenant.

DUBLIN, Jan. 17. Great importance is attached to the arrests made in this city, on Friday night. It is believed that proof can be obtained of a plot to kill Earl Spencer, the Lord Lieutenant, with the use of bombs. Consternation is said to prevail among the conspirators, and more arrests will be made to-day.

Scotch Traffic Stopped.

GLASGOW, Jan. 17. The goods traffic in the west of Scotland has been stopped owing to a strike on the Callidoman Railway.

The Milwaukee Horror.

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 17. Sceller, the bar keeper of the Newhall House, has been arrested for setting fire to the building.

Late Telegraph Notes.

The Duchess of Connaught was safely delivered of a son at Windsor Castle on Saturday last.

It is estimated that the losses by the recent floods in Germany will reach 80,000,000 marks.

Thompson Bros., flour mills of Toronto, were destroyed by fire on Sunday morning; net loss about \$20,000.

During a performance at the circus in Berdicheff, in Russian Poland, on the 14th, a fire broke out in the building, and before the spectators could escape the whole structure was ablaze. Three hundred persons perished in the flames.

The body of an old man named Dronin has been exhumed at Arthabaska and the stomach brought to Quebec for analysis, the suspicion having got abroad that the deceased was poisoned by one of the Chabots, who are under arrest for the late brutal murder at that place to obtain his property.

The United States House of Representatives, on Friday last, passed the shipping bill after striking out sections containing a drawback free ships and free materials. The provisions of the bill as passed remove many objectionable features of the old laws in the matter of Consular fees, tonnage taxes, the payment of advance wages, etc. It is believed the bill will readily pass the Senate.

About one hundred gentlemen from Detroit and various parts of the State met at Merrill Hall, on the 13th inst., and organized the State Free League. The object of the league is stated to be dissemination of a knowledge of the doctrines of free trade by means of lectures, conventions, distribution of documents, and perfection of effective organizations. They elected an executive committee of twenty-two members, who have full charge of the organization. The league is considered non-partisan and proposes to make public sentiments which shall force political parties to adopt its creed.

The men were very much exhausted, having been at work day and night since the fire broke out.

The British ship Wild Deer, from Glasgow to New Zealand, with 200 passengers, is ashore at North Rock, Cloughy, Ireland, and will become a total wreck. The passengers have been landed.
