Gerda Information Request Awkward For United States

OTTAWA (CP)—The United States government has been placed in an awkward position by the request of the Canadian government for information on Gerda Hessler Munsinger.

Should the U.S. supply such information, knowing that it could be used for political ends?

A precedent exists for any refusal to pass security information between Ottawa and Washington. It was set by Prime Minister Pearson when he was external affairs minister in 1957.

Frau Munsinger, central figure in an alleged sex-and-security case here, was barred entry to the U.S. in 1953 and came to Canada in 1955. She lived in Canada nearly six years.

Justice Minister Cardin says the German woman was engaged in espionage work for the Communists.

David Fulton, former Conservative justice minister, says his recollection of the 1961 RCMP Munsinger file is that she was not considered a security risk while in Canada. And he has noted that the Liberals were in power in 1955 when she was admitted.

If the U.S. has information that Frau Munsinger was a genuine security risk in 1953, Mr. Cardin's contention—though not explain why she was admitted to this country.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says skies were clear over the Maritimes late Wednesday as a large high pressure area approached from the west. The high pressure area was moving slowly and will provide mostly sunny skies over the Maritimes for the next two days. Temperatures will rise to the high 30s or low 40s in western regions today. In Prince Edward Island and Eastern Nova Scotia they should reach the low to mid 30s.

Installing Of Sewer Lines Discussed At Georgetown

With Mayor Howard S. MacLean presiding and Councillors: J.W. Lavers, Mrs. Joan Currie, James G. McConnell and Joseph E. Johnson in attendance—the Georgetown Town Council met in regular session on Monday night.

For some time the Council has been considering the installing of a number of sewer lines in the Town and have obtained plans and specifications from Laurie A. Coles and Associates, consulting engineers, relative to the laying of six parcels of sewer lines. The proposed lines would serve West Street; Victoria Street; Water Street; Kent Street; Richmond Street and also serve a proposed Trailer Park, situated on East Street, between the extensions of Richmond and Grafton Streets.

The proposed sewer lines would be hooked up with the now installed industrial sewer lines. The new lines would also include lateral lines to the property lines of the various residences on the streets that the sewer lines will serve.

It would be the responsibility of the home owner to run a line from his basement to the end of the lateral line where it met the property boundary. It had been hoped to obtain a long term loan for this purpose from Municipal Development and Loan Fund but the Province's quota under this fund has been spent.

The council also proposed to pave Richmond Street from Victoria Street to East Street and a section of West Street and George Street to meet existing pavement and also to do some other necessary street work.

Following a discussion it was moved that the Town of Georgetown request for Provincial

Government for a long term loan amounting to one hundred thousand dollars to be guaranteed by the town's per capita grant. The Council is of the opinion that the sewer lines are of prime importance if people are to be attracted to build in Georgetown.

It is understood, from press reports that the Province is now receiving a considerable sum of money from the Dominion Government on loan from the Canada Pension Fund contributions and it is felt that a guaranteed loan could be made to the town at the same interest rate as the province pays for the money.

The financial report was presented by Councillor Lavers, and was adopted. A considerable refund is due the town on money expended under the Winter Works programme. Councillor Currie reported no applications for relief and no applications for additional street lights. Councillor McConnell reported for Public Property and this report showed that the work at the risk of installing the new furnace and other necessary carpentry work has been completed. Councillor Johnson's Police Report was delivered by Town Policeman Allison Grover, who gave a detailed day-by-day report of his duties for the month. The report showed a total of \$105, collected in fines during the month of February.

As no information had been received as to the amount of the per capita grant for 1966, until the Legislature has dealt with the matter, it was necessary to leave the matter of drawing up a town budget over to a future meeting.

A letter from the Attorney General on the question of having the Royal Canadian Mounted Police engaged under contract to police the town was read. The letter stated that Ottawa had estimated the town's requirements to be four RCMP members. The council are in no financial position to consider engaging four police officers and the clerk was instructed to write the Attorney General for clarification as to the minimum number of RCMP members the town could hope to contract for and also some further information as to hours of duty that would be performed per week under a contract.

Oldest Mason In U.S. Dies

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. (AP)—Thomas Yould, a native of Windsor, N.S., and the oldest Mason in the United States, died Wednesday at the Minnesota Masonic Home. He would have been 109 April 13.

Yould was principal figure Tuesday in a ceremony in which he presented a gold trowel to be used in cornerstone laying for a 130-bed Masonic care centre infirmary to be completed next year.

He became a Mason 87 years ago and entered the Masonic Home in 1950.

Yould came to Minneapolis in 1894 and was employed by the Minneapolis Tribune as a pressman. Later he moved to St. Paul where he became foreman for the St. Paul Dispatch and Pioneer Press and later for the old St. Paul Daily News. He retired when The News suspended publication in 1938.

Survivors include a daughter, two grandsons and six great grandchildren.

IMPORT VACCINE
CANTON, Australia—Australia will buy 600,000 doses of Salk polio vaccine in Canada and Britain to overcome a temporary shortage of Australian-made vaccine, the health minister, Dr. A. J. Forbes, said Wednesday. The emergency purchase follows the failure of a 500,000-dose batch of Australian-made vaccine to pass tests. The British and Canadian vaccine is to arrive in April.
