THE QUEEN'S REQUEST.—Mr. Hensley, of Halifax, has received a letter from the Queen saying that Her Majesty will be glad to receive a photo of his son, the lamented Captain Hensley, recently killed during the fighting on the Tugela.

SCOTT ACT.—Before Stipendiary Magistrate Blanchard, at Montague, yesterday evening, Margaret Young was fined \$50 or two months imprisonment for violating the Scott Act. A case against Elizabeth Campbell was adjourned for further evidence, and a summons against Mary Campbell was dismissed.

THE NEW COMMANDER.—It is pointed out by an exchange that Major General Smith Dorrie, mentioned as likely to command the brigade to which the Canadians are attached, saw service in the Zulu war of 1879, Egyptian war of 1882, Nile campaign in 1885, Soudan in 1885-86, N. W. frontier (India) in 1897, and Khartoum in 1898. He holds the distinguished service order, many medals and clasps.

TRANSVAAL TYRANNY.—The tyranny of the Transvaal government was brought home to Washington people recently by the arrival here of R. E. Brown, who was deprived of the immense sum of \$5,000,000 by the arbitrary act of President Kruger, after the Supreme Court of the Transvaal had awarded it to him. The reward was so displeasing to President Kruger that he gave the judges a severe lecturing and threatened their dismissal from office. This amount is a reversal of the verdict of the court, for Brown was never able to collect one dollar of the amount awarded him.
