**CATTLE TRADE.**—A company, with a capital of \$15,000, has been started in Halifax for the purpose of exporting cattle to England, and arrangements have already been made for shipping 1,000 head of Nova Scotia cattle and sheep to the British market.

**TRADE IN DEAD MEAT.**—Ten tons of dead meat were shipped to England from Halifax on Saturday last. The shipping to England of dead meat has proved quite successful and Nova Scotia shippers are encouraged to enter into the business extensively.

We see, by late Boston papers, that Mr. Eph Clow, formerly of North Wiltshire, P. E. I., has distinguished himself in a 70-hour walking match, which took place recently in Boston Music Hall. Mr. Clow covered 326 miles and 8 laps, and carried off fourth prize. The first prize was won by Pauchot, who covered 345 miles and 15 laps.

We received the following advertisement to-day from a respectable gentleman in this city:—"Wanted—Two or three policemen, to disperse gangs of roughs who meet at the corners on Prince street on Sabbath evenings. These roughs may be found from the upper corner of Judge Young's grounds to the Athenaeum. They cause ladies and others much annoyance, as they frequently blockade the way."

**HAY TRADE.**—An experiment of shipping hay from Nova Scotia to the West Indies has been successfully made by a Halifax firm. The firm shipped 100 tons in January, and after paying all expenses, netted \$32. The same firm have 152 tons of hay on the way to the West Indies, and have 700 or 800 tons awaiting shipment in Cumberland. Hay is quoted at Barbadoes and other Islands at \$27 to \$30 per ton, and in Halifax at \$12 per ton.

**DIPHTHERIA A TERROR.**—Among the many families in this section of the Province that have been visited by diphtheria is that of a Frenchman living on the Passaic road, about two miles from Moncton. A few days ago one of the children died of the disease, and the unfortunate father, being too poor, probably, to go to the expense of getting an undertaker, was obliged to conduct the funeral of his own child, and bury the body in a rough box.—*Moncton Times.*

**POULTRY TRADE.**—Messrs. G. P. Henry & Co., of Halifax, shipped to England in December last, 157 geese, 100 pairs partridges, 602 turkeys, and 25 pairs ducks, the lot realizing in Liverpool, after paying all expenses of wharfage, freight, and allowing for heavy losses through bad packing and in transit, &c., &c., \$900, and clearing the shippers quite a respectable profit. The geese and turkeys were of a superior quality, the former averaging 10 and the latter 11 lbs. each; and the most of them were raised at Brookfield, Colchester County, N. S.

Mr. DANIEL MOORESIDE, farmer, of North River, died very suddenly in this city on Saturday evening. He, in company with his son, left their house on Saturday with teams loaded with timber. While on the ice Mr. Moorside became dizzy and chilled, and continued in that state until they arrived in this city. When they had sold the timber, Mr. Moorside proceeded to the "Farmers Arms" with the intention of warming himself. While there the chills increased, and he fell into an epileptic fit. The keeper of the hotel did all in his power to relieve him, and with a view of having him more promptly revived, removed him to Drs. Jenkins & McLeod's surgery. From there he was removed to a warm room in Mr. Whitney's hotel, and was diligently attended by Dr. McLeod. But medical skill proved of no avail, and Mr. Moorside died about 9 o'clock of apoplexy. The deceased was 60 years of age. He leaves a family of two sons and three daughters.

**A LONG LIVED FAMILY.**—A notice of a death which appears in our columns has induced us to make enquiries respecting a family remarkable for the great age to which its members have attained. Nicholas Jenkins and his wife emigrated to this Island from Germany about the year 1782 with three children. They settled first at Vernon River, and removed, after a short stay, to Cherry Valley, from which place they came to Pownal, where they resided to the day of their death. After coming to the Island seven children were born to them, some of whom are still living.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.

The Herald Relief Committee publishes a card to the Dublin papers stating their readiness to furnish relief to the sufferers. The Archbishop of Dublin represents Archbishop McCloskey at Dublin.

LONDON, Feb. 28.

A Vienna correspondent says there is no doubt that a strong conviction prevails in Germany that so long as Gen. Milotino as Minister of War, manages the military affairs of Russia, Germany cannot be assured as to the ulterior designs of Russia, nor cooperate politically with her.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 28.

All classes here feel that the new appointment of General Melikoff is necessary and wise.

LONDON, Feb. 28.

A despatch from Copenhagen, dated Friday night, says that a fire is raging there which threatens the destruction of an entire quarter. The fire brigade appears unable to cope with it. Fears are entertained for the British Embassy.

The King and Crown Prince of Denmark are on the scene.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.

A deputation from the press gallery waited upon the Speaker with a recommendation to lengthen the lower gallery and abandon the upper one as useless, and, if necessary, construct another lower gallery on the other side of the Chamber.

The Speaker intimated his favourable consideration, and it is expected the recommendation will be carried out.

Mr Wallace of Norfolk, addressed a group of members this morning, in the Chamber, in behalf of his hobby, the "Rag-baby." It met less favor than was expected, even Mr. Plumb dissented from the doctrines.

It is stated that three millions of bushels of wheat were imported into Canada this year, none of which paid duty.

Senator Carvell, with Messrs. Brecken and McDonald, M. P.'s, waited on the Minister of Justice this morning, asking him to increase the salaries of the P. E. I. Judges.

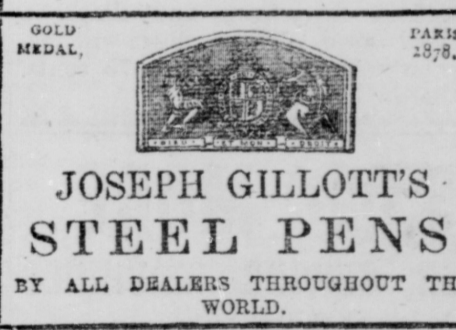
