THE brig, Shamrock, O'Connell, master, arrived at New York yesterday.

THE blowing up of a Japanese coasting steamer is reported, with the loss of eighty-three lives.

THE Princess Louise draws, sculptures, designs lace and attends to charitable work with equal vigor.

THE Roman Catholic "Academy of Holy Angels," at Buffalo, N. Y., was burned on Saturday afternoon. Loss, \$65,000.

IN the City of New York last year there were 964 failures, with liabilities amounting to \$64,000,000.

THE schr. Frances, from this port, and Ene-line, from Summerside, arrived at Vineyard Haven with cargoes of produce, on the 2nd inst.

IT is said the Queen would give the Bishopric of Durham to the Dean of Westminster, if he cared to accept it. But Dean Stanley prefers the Abbey.

A SERIES of missionary meetings, by the Church of England, are being held at Montreal. The Treasurer, Mr. C. J. Brydges, reports the mission fund in debt \$7,000.

IN our City Council report, in yesterday's issue, we inadvertently published the name of Mr. Alexander Brown as Fire Warden of Ward Five, instead of Mr. Ambrose Brown.

IT is generally acknowledged that a house of entertainment for passengers and others coming from a distance by train, should be sustained in this place. Mr. Bolger keeps a hotel open at all hours to the travelling public, opposite the Railway Station, where they will be properly accommodated.

THE St. John Telegraph says: "Three Chapters of the Royal Black Knights, Loyal Orange Association, are to be organized during the ensuing spring and summer. Of these, one will be instituted in P. E. Island—probably Charlottetown—another in Halifax, and the third at St. Stephen. The Chapter located in this city has, within the past year, been unusually prosperous."

SIR GEORGE BOWEN has been for some time Governor of Victoria at £10,000 a year; now he goes to the Mauritius at £6,000. But there are not so many expenses at the new post, and there is infinitely less work. Lord Normanby, the only peer in the ordinary colonial service, leaves New Zealand to succeed Sir George Bowen. Sir Hercules Robinson quits New South Wales (£7,000 a year) for New Zealand (£7,000).

MISS CECILE GREENBANK, daughter of a Swiss Protestant minister in a Swiss settlement in Pennsylvania, went to Montreal some time ago to stay with a maiden aunt, remaining undue time under a promise of marriage from one James Holland. Holland backed out, whereupon Miss Greenbank entered an action in Supreme Court for breach of promise. Holland fled to Cincinnati, and news has been received this week that he committed suicide in a bar-room with a pistol, while under the influence of alcohol.

MICHAEL McMAHON—a respectable-looking young man—appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon, charged with the larceny of two pairs of boots from Mr. Charles Leigh. The boots were stolen a few days ago. Mr. Leigh informed the Marshall of the fact, and gave a description of the boots. Yesterday he cast suspicion on McMahon—he being recently in Mr. Leigh's employ. Meeting him on the street he examined his footwear, and found on him a pair of boots similar to those described by Mr. Leigh. McMahon was taken to the Police Station. Mr. Leigh was sent for and identified the laces, but not the boots. It was afterwards discovered that McMahon traded the newest pair of the stolen boots for the ones he had on with a shoemaker named Kitchen, with whom he left the other stolen ones to be repaired. He was sentenced to three months' imprisonment with hard labor.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

TASKEND, Jan. 8.

General Kauffman has just received from Afghanistan a letter from General Rasgoff announcing the following facts: Gen. Rasgoff left Cabul with Shere Ali and all his battalions for the Russian frontier. On leaving his capital the Ameer sent letters to all the English generals, saying that he had left full power with his son Yakob Khan, who had been directed to decline all negotiations with the invaders of his country, and he (Shere Ali) was on his way to St. Petersburg to submit his differences with Great Britain to the Emperor Alexander.

General Kauffman telegraphed to Prince Gortschakoff for instructions as to his conduct in the event of the Ameer crossing the Russian frontier. Up to this time no reply has been received. Kauffman has advised the reception of the Ameer with such honors as accorded to potentates visiting the Dominions of the Emperor.

LONDON, Jan. 8.

The "Standard's" correspondent, with the Quettah clymn, telegraphs that the commander of the British advanced cavalry has sent back a despatch stating that the Governor of Candahar has occupied a defensive position on the Tarnak River. Generals Stewart and Biddulph will commence a joint advance to-day (Wednesday). They hope to defeat the Governor and enter Candahar about 10th inst.

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 7.

The captain of the ship "Cambrian," from Callao, reports that on the 29th of December, in lat. 48 N., lon. 19 W., he passed a large ship on fire, evidently abandoned. She was painted black, brig rigged, had straight stem, and apparently square stern. Her foremast and boats were gone, and forward topworks were burned. No name visible on any part of her.

LONDON, Jan. 7.

The "Times" says the Irish Executive is seriously considering the question of the release of O'Kelly, the only remaining Fenian prisoner.

BARNLEY, Jan. 7.

The strike of miners in South Yorkshire and North Derbyshire will not be near so large as anticipated. It is expected now that not more than 6,000 operatives will go out on a strike.

DUBLIN, Jan. 7.

The Council of the Irish Home Rule League have determined to call a general meeting on the 4th of Feby, for re-organization of the Government in Ireland.

AROLSON, GERMANY, Jan. 6.

The King of Holland was married to the Princess Emma, of Waldeck, at Pymont, this evening, with great solemnity. The Duke of Saxony, and Prince William of Wurtemberg were witnesses. Prince Henry, of Netherlands, brother of the King, was unable to be present on account of illness.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 7.

The plague at Astrakhan is assuming serious proportions, and fugitives have carried the contagion to three adjacent villages. Quarantine has been proclaimed throughout the district of Enotaievsk. There have been 400 deaths from this disease to January the 4th.

VIENNA, Jan. 7.

A despatch to the Political Correspondent from Scutaria, reports: Hussein Pasha and the Montenegrin delegates are conferring to-day, by order of the Porte, with reference to the surrender of Podgoritz to Montenegro.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.

The Herald, of Panama, announces that an incipient revolution, in which Segundo Pena, Governor of the district, and three others were killed, was suppressed on the night of Dec. 27th.
