O'Leary Community Hospital To Have Financial Campaign

O'LEARY — A financial drive will be launched in all of the community hospitals in P.E.I. It was announced following a meeting of the board of directors Monday night.

Errol Stetson, president of the board, pointed out the ever-growing need for extra space, as over-crowding is evident in all areas of the hospital.

Extra financial assistance is also needed, Mr. Stetson

stated, for buying new equipment for which the Hospital Services Commission of P.E.I. cannot be responsible.

The community hospital was built in 1937, and has served a great community need. Because of this need, the directors expressed confidence that citizens of O'Leary and surrounding districts would support this financial campaign to its fullest extent.

Keith Barrett, Miscouche, Elected Maritime Director

At the annual meeting of the Canadian Deer Pup at Shortzorn Society, Keith Barrett, Miscouche, P.E.I., was re-elected for an additional three-year term as director, representing the Maritimes and Quebec. Officers elected were: president, Joseph Sullivan, Peterborough, Ont.; vice-president, Ross Hewitt, York, Ont.; secretary-treasurer, E.H. Stoltz, Rockwood, Ont.

Reference was made to the outstanding dual purpose show at Charlottetown. In recent years, this show has been second only to the Royal Winter Fair in numbers and quality of exhibitors.

Waldron MacPhee, Bonshaw, who won the Sempur Trophy for bird production in 1961 was runner up for 1962. His excellent cow, Lily was also awarded a silver medal for production, and qualifies for advanced registry (superior type and production).

The Nova Scotia herd of Ralph Armstrong, Kingston, also supplied one of the A.R. cows, the high producing Brookmont Lass, classified V.G.

During the past year, six P.E.I. herds were recorded on record of production, with one from Nova Scotia, two from New Brunswick and four from Quebec. Production averages tended to be a bit higher than those of the previous year, with two-year-olds averaging 6,685 pounds milk; three-year-olds averaging 7,061 pounds milk; four-year-olds averaging 7,491 pounds milk and mature cows averaging 7,985 pounds milk.

The winner of this debate tackles the University of Alberta on Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock for the Dominion championship. Mr. Callaghan and Mr. McLean recently won the Atlantic crown by gaining unanimous decisions over Memorial University, St. John's, Newfoundland, and St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish.

The Red and White scholars debate the same topic in Ottawa Saturday as they did in Antigonish last Monday. However, they do not yet know whether they will be arguing the same side of the resolution. The topic is "Resolved that the space race is beneficial to humanity."

The local debaters leave today by plane for Ottawa, accompanied by their coach, Rev. Dr. F. P. Bolger.

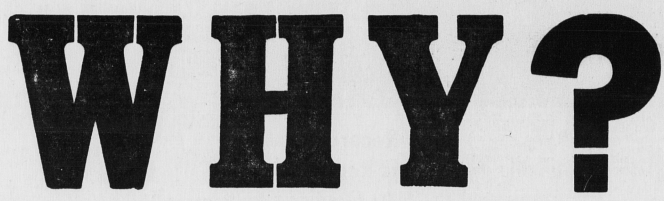

Through personal letters, and through the medium of this newspaper, each citizen will present the full story, all the facts, so that each citizen who may ever require the services of either hospital, will be fully acquainted with the facts and the reasons for such a campaign.

The following is a joint statement . . . issued today by P. A. Murnaghan of the Charlottetown Hospital, and William Hayward of the Prince Edward Island Hospital

The condition in which YOUR hospitals find themselves today is a serious one . . . lack of proper equipment . . . lack of sufficient numbers of skilled personnel . . . serious space problems within each hospital . . . and many other inadequacies which, together, make it more and more difficult for YOUR hospital to provide adequate facilities necessary to diagnose and treat the sick.

- Briefly, and without speaking of more complicated financial problems which face YOUR hospitals at the present time, these are the facts:
- hospital insurance protects you against the financial cost of hospital care—it does NOT provide the full cost of hospital operations.
 - the Charlottetown Hospital has no funds with which to provide expanded and needed accommodation for children.
 - P. E. I. Hospital needs funds to complete its renovation program and to pay for services already given—but not covered by Hospital Insurance!
 - your hospitals take the loss on patients who are not insured and there is no way of recovering this loss.
 - hospital insurance does NOT allow for bank interest payments; and therefore, this must be paid by your hospital.
 - hospital insurance pays salaries; however, to get the skilled personnel required the hospital itself must pay MORE than the funds received from the commission.
 - hospital insurance guarantees a service—but does not provide the personnel to give you this service.
 - in short, hospital insurance pays your bill for hospitalization; however, it does NOT provide the hospital—nor the facilities—nor the equipment—so needed to ensure your treatment.

In succeeding messages to you, we will endeavour to explain this financial campaign in greater detail. However, we trust that our opening remarks in this matter will explain the situation with which we are now faced.
